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HARVEST CAMPS, 1918.

THIS year marked a distinct step in our efforts towards helping the country in the matter of harvesting ; for though in one sense harvest camps are now for us ordinary routine activities—old friends, so to speak—and have already received some of the venerability of tradition, in another sense we have not achieved a

harvest camp at all. We are on our way. Last year we collected a number of volunteers, transported them to Devonshire, put them under canvas, and introduced an organisation which would have been suitable if harvesting had had to be done. This year harvesting was done ; and moreover the volunteers seemed to enjoy themselves quite as much, with all their hard labour, as they did in idleness in the 1917 Devonshire camp. We

congratulate them on the spirit they showed and the cheerfulness with which they worked, doing as much as ten hours a day, some of them at crucial times.

How then have we not achieved a perfect harvest camp? It is in this that though we have done good work, we are not sure the results have been equivalent—we are not sure that our services have been used for the greatest advantage of the country. Our time was divided between three shifts; the first worked from July 1 to 21, the second from Aug. 3 to 24, the third from Aug. 24 to Sept. 14. Each shift was composed of about fifty boys, who camped out in a field adjoining Broadoak, an East Sussex hamlet. For work they distributed themselves in groups of from two to twelve over the neighbouring farms, serving a district of about four miles radius. Now most of the farmers who employed us had not lost more than one or two hands owing to the war, and had carried on throughout the year well enough; we were intended in their mind to take the place of those extra hands whom normally they can pick up just at the crucial times for shocking, carting and stacking. But we, sacrificing part of our holidays, and undergoing the expenses of camp, were not prepared to be dumped down in Sussex as a reserve store and used only when the farmers thought fit. We insisted that it was up to the farmers to employ us during our whole time, and that as a rule they did. But the fact remains that much of our work was merely to fill up, and we were often told that what we had spent several days on would have been done in one day by a man with a machine, had we not happened to be residing in the neighbourhood. This appeared to all rather unsatisfactory; partly no doubt it was due to the nature of farming itself, but partly also, we feel sure, to the lack of co-operation or organising skill on the part of the farmers. What remains to be done, therefore, to make our camps a complete success is to find how to render our work more efficacious. Perhaps

if on another occasion a bigger farmer, more used to organise labour on a large scale, could be found to employ us in a body, better results would be achieved.

We must not, however, be discouraged by these few shortcomings. From our own point of view, as a source of enjoyment and a part of our education, the camp was highly successful. To do a little manual work, when everyone is doing so much, was in itself a satisfaction. We always hope that by being dutiful schoolboys we are training ourselves for great accomplishments; our hopes, however, must needs be in the air; when at work on the land we felt we were accomplishing something definite, something undoubtedly useful, however little. And we did it almost as a way of holiday-making. Bathing in the sea at Winchelsea or exploring the old east Sussex villages was the occupation of our hours off work, while in the evening were games and merry-making. The surroundings were beautiful enough. The scintillating atmosphere and the sight of tower-capped Winchelsea and Rye perched on their heights gave the toil of those working on the marshes of the Brede an exquisite refinement. And for those whose lot it was to drive cattle across the country their work bore little hardship. A childish excitement would beset them such as arises in the breast of a boy at his game of trains. The whole was in fact an experience well worth undergoing.

We cannot thank Capt. Willett enough for his success in making the camp itself as attractive as possible, both by his organisation and by spreading in his vicinity a subtle atmosphere of cheerfulness and content, delightful for all. We had the roughness of camp life without the harshness of military discipline, and the resulting conditions were such that we both profited by the comradeship and enjoyed the adventure.

Mr. BELL, a son of the Rev. James Allen Bell, vicar of Wimbledon, was at the School from September 1901 to Christmas 1903, one of many brothers who were Westminster, the eldest of whom, formerly a student of Christ Church, is now chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury. He joined the Army for the war.

Mr. BOWMAN, a son of the late Rev. Arthur Gerald Bowman, vicar of St. Mark's, Kennington, was at the School from January 1901 to Election 1905. He also joined the Army for the war.

Major CHALLIS, elder son of Mr. Charles Edward Challis of Brixton, was at the School from January 1885 to Christmas 1888. He became a solicitor and practised at Rochester, where for twelve years he was in the West Kent Yeomanry. On the outbreak of the war he obtained a commission in the R.G.A. He was a very popular O.W. and will be much regretted.

Captain CLARKE, the only son of Mr. C. S. Clarke, stockbroker, of Loughton, Essex, was at the School for the long period between September 1901 and Election 1910. He was Head of Rigaud's, Captain of Football, and a Cricket Pink. In the first innings of Charterhouse in 1901 he took eight wickets for thirty-six runs. A year later he joined the Inns of Courts O.T.C., and on the outbreak of the war remained with the Corps as an Instructor. Later he obtained permission to go to the Front and won the Military Cross last July. He is a great loss to O.W. athletics.

Mr. DRAKE-BROCKMAN, a son of Mr. Paris F. Drake-Brockman, Barrister-at-Law, was at the School from September 1911 to Christmas 1914. He joined the Artists Rifles and afterwards passed through Sandhurst and obtained his commission in September 1917. He went to the Front last April, saw considerable service, and proved a very capable officer.

Mr. EDWARDES, son of the Rev. George Edwardes, Diocesan Missioner, of St. Albans, was at the School from April 1912 to Election 1915.

Mr. FAULKNER, the elder son of Mr. W. B. Faulkner of New Malden, was at the School from September 1912 to Election 1916 ; and in 1913 was elected to a non-resident King's Scholarship. He showed remarkable genius for Latin and was elected Head to Christ Church in 1916. He did not go into residence but joined the Army, as a private. This was his own choice, dictated by the feeling that in his case this would be the best way to learn the work. It was characteristic of his fortitude and common sense. The conspicuous promise of scholarship which he showed was cut short on July 26 in France.

Captain GASCOYNE CECIL, the third son of the Bishop of Exeter, was at the School from May 1905 to April 1912, and was a Monitor in Ashburnham. He represented the School in the Gymnastic Competition at Aldershot. He became an engineer and was a Territorial officer in a howitzer battery at Vickers' works. At Christmas 1914 the brigade became a Divisional Ammunition Column and he went to the Front. He was mentioned in dispatches on the Ypres battle. Transferred to Salonika he obtained the Military Cross. Brought back to the Western front he fell on the 27th of August. It will be remembered that we have already had to record the deaths of his eldest and his youngest brothers, and our deepest sympathy is due to his parents on their heavy loss. The surviving brother, who has been twice wounded, is in the Hampshire Regiment.

Mr. GARRETT, a son of Mr. Lewis B. Garrett of Maida Vale, was at the School from January 1899 to Election 1901. He joined the Army for the war. His elder brother, elected Head to Christ Church in 1894, joined the Indian Civil Service and died at Belgaum in 1901.

THE PAST CRICKET SEASON.

A DISAPPOINTING season—due, it may fairly be said, to the inability of the Old Colours to do themselves justice.

At the beginning of the season, it would appear that our bowling, though it contained plenty of variety, lacked sting and that the batting was our stronger point. This was however reversed, at least, to the extent that the batting became very inconsistent and that the bowling improved.

Our first victory was a most creditable one over the Wanderers when the School, after getting the Club all out for 46, knocked up a useful 192. A word here might be said about the match at Bellingham against the Merchant Taylors, which was played on a wicket on which no proper cricket could be played, owing to the excessive rain we had had during the week. Our highest aggregate was made at the Oval against the Surrey Club, when after the School had lost 6 wickets for 72, Gorman and Rudge put on 164, the score eventually reaching 269. Gorman's innings of 94 was the best one played for the School during the season. Our other win was against the Grenadier Guards, whom we beat fairly easily by 89 runs. In our School matches we were very unsuccessful, being badly beaten by Tonbridge and St. Paul's, and just beaten by Radley after a very exciting match. Our chief match, the Charterhouse match, we were unable to play owing to influenza which was pervading both the schools at the time. Capt. P. F. Warner's XI. included, besides himself, two others who had played for England and three who had played for the Dominions, in the match which was played at Lord's the previous Saturday. We did very well in getting 6 of these wickets down for 67, and eventually getting them all out for 209.

The season has brought forward some very promising cricketers, of whom perhaps the most significant is Taylor. There is, of course, very little strength in his strokes at present, so that most of his runs are scored behind the wicket. Another young member of the team who should be useful next year is Berryman, who can put down quite a fast ball. He should try to increase his pace, as a really fast bowler is essential at Vincent Square. As a left-hand batsman too, he should, with a little more experience, prove useful. Wade is the other Pink who is staying for next season.

Appended is a criticism of individual players.

C. E. STONES made an excellent and popular captain. Although he was not so successful with the bat as last year, he made some useful scores. At cover his fielding and catching was

excellent. His energy and keenness made themselves felt throughout the team.

H. J. SALWEY did not come up to the form expected of him. He is rather inclined to get over-keen and lose his nerve. He has a good scoring shot over mid-on's head, but there is room for improvement in his back-play.

A. W. F. HOBSON, despite the fact that he did not bowl last year, turned out one of the most successful bowlers. As a batsman, like the other Old Colours he failed to fulfil expectations. He is one of the best fielders in the side.

H. F. GORMAN, who will be Captain next year, should, with a little more experience, become a very good bat. His 94 at the Oval was the best innings of the Season played for the School. He could make himself a useful left-hand bowler, if he did not bowl so much on the leg side. Though rather an uncertain field, he has taken some good catches.

H. N. RUDGE is an erratic bowler, but on his day bowls very well indeed. His best performance was against Capt. P. F. Warner's XI., when he took 6 good wickets. He would put his bowling to better advantage if he were to vary his pace more. As a batsman, he has little style. A fairly safe field, but inclined to be slack.

G. L. S. KOHNSTAMM kept wicket very well until he unfortunately had to leave at mid-term to join up. There is plenty of room for improvement in his batting.

H. A. CLEGG, though rather disappointing, played some good innings. He is a slow and steady player and has been very useful as an opening batsman. Not a brilliant field, wasting too much time in throwing in.

F. D. BERRYMAN is a very promising young cricketer. He bowls quite a fast ball, right-handed, keeping a splendid length. A stylish left-hand bat, he hits hard and should be an invaluable asset to the side next year. Is a keen and at times brilliant field.

P. V. WADE is not by any means a pretty left-hand bat. On the off-side, he is far too inclined to let the ball play the bat. As a bowler, he has not come on as well as expected. Though at times slack in the field, he has brought off some very good catches.

E. W. ST. G. SPENCER entered the side as a batsman at the beginning of the season, but not coming up to expectations was dropped for a few matches. When, however, Kohnstamm left, he succeeded him at the wicket, in which position he did quite well. His best innings was 25 not out for the last wicket against Mr. Fevez's XII.

Then followed a good stand by Stones and Taylor. Stones played a fine innings for 67. With the score at 213 for 8 wickets, the innings was declared closed. Eccles was the most successful bowler, taking 5 for 76.

Radley started well, putting on 39 for the first wicket. The Westminster bowling was far from good, no one being able to keep a length. Owing to some good hitting by Worsley and Garratt the score stood at 133 for 5. Elstone, still hitting well, and Murray took the game into their own hands, passing Westminster's score without being separated.

Obituary.

THE death of JOHN RICHARD ARMITSTEAD removes the last survivor of those who were admitted into College in 1844. The eldest son of John Armitstead, vicar of Sandbach, he came to the School in 1841, and was elected to Christ Church in 1848. He took Orders, and after holding for three years the rectory of Wendlebury succeeded to his father's vicarage. The successive tenure of father and son was nearly ninety years. In 1898 Mr. Armitstead was made an honorary canon of Chester. He married in 1866 Frances Mary, eldest daughter of William Henry Hornby, M.P., and his eldest son, now the Rev. John Hornby Armitstead, was at the School from 1882 to 1884, and since his father's death has been presented to the vicarage of Sandbach. Mr. Armitstead was Lord of the Manor of Cranage and a county alderman for Cheshire. For many years he was a familiar figure in the hunting field. He died on September 16.

We have also lost a distinguished man of service in FREDERICK EUSTACE BATTEN, M.D., F.R.C.P. A son of the late John Winterbotham Batten, barrister-at-law, he was at the School from 1878 to 1883 and graduated from Trinity College, Cambridge. He practised in London and was for many years on the honorary staff of the National Hospital for the Paralysed and of the Hospital for Sick Children in Great Ormond Street. He was one of our greatest experts on the palsy, and his application of light celloid splinting to prevent deformity will be a boon to generations of children. Full of physical and mental vigour, he died after a serious operation. He was one of our Life Subscribers.

Correspondence.

To the Editor of 'The Elizabethan.'

SIR,—I was greatly interested in your criticism of the past football season, especially in the general comments on Westminster football, and it is with reference to these that I wish to make a few comments and suggestions.

There can be no doubt that Westminster football for the last few years has been disappointing. So often has a team which promised to have an excellent season either lost its form in the Lent term, when the most important matches are played, or else failed unaccountably against teams that it should easily have beaten. It is easy to suggest reasons for these failures—lack of space, the day-boy problem, difficulty of training and so on.—Your correspondent has mentioned these. I would suggest an additional reason, which I feel confident will largely explain these repeated failures. Anyone who examines the ELIZABETHAN of recent years will be struck with the repeated references to 'failures in front of goal, number of chances missed, wild shooting etc.' This is nothing but the truth. Westminster forwards suffer, or certainly have suffered for the last few years from an apparent aversion to getting goals. They may be seen at any match giving a really clever exhibition of the short-passing game, but (and this is my point, sir), though short-passing is usually carried to an absurd length when only twenty yards from goal, a forward will pass rather than make an effort to score a goal himself. I am not in any way advocating unscientific individualism but I do suggest most strongly that the forward line needs a little more dash and determination to get goals. One has an uncomfortable feeling that the forwards are more fully occupied with giving and taking passes than getting towards their opponents' goal. The boxing ring will supply an analogy. How often does one see a clever scientific boxer beaten by a less scientific but more hustling opponent, whose one aim is to get home on his adversary's body. The parallel is so exact that the knock-out in the first round, which our energetic friend may easily achieve, has actually occurred at Vincent Square, I regret to say, when the opposing team has rushed a goal in the first few minutes of the game. A little more of what the Army calls 'The offensive spirit' is needed. Develop this first of all, then teach your man to play the game scientifically, but never let him forget that a goal scored is of much greater importance than a well-forced pass, and that to hang about in front of goal is nothing short of criminal.

Perhaps others will be interested in this subject.

To the Editor of 'The Elizabethan.'

SIR,—It is some months since I have seen the ELIZABETHAN, and I may be re-opening a matter which is already settled. I wish to appeal to those O.W.W. whom fate has left in England.

There are many of us, mostly men from abroad, who will shortly be faced by the problem of returning to civil life, with no profession to fall back upon and at an age when we cannot afford three or four years of study. Some of us have lost capital, or have held posts which have ceased to exist, others are prevented by ill health from returning to tropical countries.

We have had vague promises that the Government will find work for demobilised officers, but the department responsible will have great difficulty in providing for the thousands of officers who were junior clerks and manual workers before the war, and is certain to adopt a 'take it or leave it' attitude. No one expects or wishes these

men to give up the position which they have won for themselves, but at the same time I think we are justified in calling upon O.W.W. as a body to see that we are not crowded out. I am not asking for charity, but for sympathetic treatment and employment that will enable us to give our children the same up-bringing as we had ourselves.

Will the School authorities or the Elizabethan Club undertake the necessary organisation?
