## THE PAST CRICKET SEASON.

THE cricket season of 1903 may be put down as a record one in the way of wet weather, it being universally admitted that so much rain has never fallen in one summer during the memory of man. Fortunately for Westminster, Vincent Square has acquired a reputation for drying quicker than any other ground in London, but in spite of this three matches were abandoned out of the first seven, which is sufficiently disheartening for any young body of cricketers.

The season's record is as follows: twelve matches played—five lost, five drawn, two won—not a good record on paper, certainly, but one which will bear closer inspection. It must be borne in mind that the young cricketer is always at a disadvantage on sticky wickets. The school bowler does not benefit from the sticky wicket in the same manner as his more experienced rival; he has not got the length nor the control of the ball, and the art of defence,

and—what is even more difficult—the art of acquiring scoring-strokes on a bowler's wicket are things which can only be gained by experience. Moreover, slow and fast wickets succeeded each other with bewildering rapidity, and no sooner had the batsmen learned to play back and watch the ball on the slow wickets than a few fine days would crop up and the ball would come off the pitch at a pace which would require fast forward strokes. Coleby is a case in point; after starting well on the slow wickets and developing really sound defence, he was time after time bowled out on much easier wickets by balls he could have played easily forward. But one cannot expect over-much adaptability from the school cricketer. Scores of 309 for seven, 321 for six, 342 for seven, and 296 for five, compiled during the only real spell of fine weather, show what a dangerous batting side we must have been had we been favoured with our customary fine wickets throughout the season. The opening match was distinctly disappointing. School batted moderately against by no means deadly bowling, and were only saved from overwhelming defeat by some really good bowling by Hepburn. He started by bowling a shocking length, but going on a second time secured four wickets in his first over, including the hattrick, eventually dismissing five of the side, a performance which gave rise to great hopes, which were unfortunately doomed to disappointment, as he never afterwards looked like getting many wickets. A good match with a strong side of Old Wykehamists, in which the School were defeated by a bare majority of twenty-four after a very plucky fight, was followed by a crushing defeat from the Butterflies and a drawn game with the Zingari, in which the honours were decidedly with the XI. The Charterhouse match followed. At the end of the first day Westminster had established a nice little advantage, which was maintained till well on into the second afternoon, and when Charterhouse went in for the fourth innings with 200 to win and Powers dismissed their two crack batsmen—both clean bowled-for ten runs it really looked as if victory were well within our grasp. However, the inevitable missed-catch followed and Bence-Pembroke slowly but surely stemmed the tide of disaster, and by a really admirable piece of batting won the match for his side. He had the satisfaction of completing his century, and his innings was an excellent combination of skill and judgment. Probably the better side won, but only the smallest piece of luck would have been necessary to reverse the verdict. The next match resulted in a win for the School. West Kent brought down a very good average club side, and the success of the XI. was thoroughly deserved. Logan played a fine innings, and Powers and Crowe bowled with fine effect, while Rawlings' innings was of great service and showed much promise.

The M.C.C. brought down Mead and Rawlin, and, as might have been expected, this attack proved too strong on a wicket which gave the bowlers some assistance. Two drawn games against Old Carthusians and Harrow Blues showed the School in a run-getting vein; and the match against the Cambridge Crusaders was

spoilt by rain.

Turning to individual performances, Logan stands easily first. After an indifferent start he played some very fine innings. Successive scores of 127, 15 and 42 (v. M.C.C.), 189, and 131 are figures which speak for themselves, and had he reached his true form before the Charterhouse match there might have been another story to tell. He is a fine, free player, with

forcing strokes all round the wicket, and when set scores very fast. He is also a very good field, and as a deep-field catcher quite above the average of good fielders. Two of his catches during the season were as good as anything of their kind could be. As captain he was keen and painstaking, and on the whole managed the side well, though he might with advantage have made more use of his slow bowlers. Next to him we must rank Crowe as a batsman. He has a very nice style, and started the season in great form, but later on seemed to lose his head, and threw away his wicket time after time-whether owing to carelessness or lack of judgment it is hard to say. Gardner and Coleby, in their different styles, were two extremely useful batsmen. The former also bowled well on occasions, and should be extremely useful next year, when he will be Rawlings played two very good innings, and is a young player of much promise. He bats in very nice style, and is of the type of school player that keeps on improving. Walters is another who, with increasing strength, should do very well in the future. Powers hit well on occasions, and Fleuret, Kirkpatrick, and Philby were all good for runs; in fact, there was really very little tail to the side. Hepburn's batting we prefer not to speak. bowling cannot be described as strong. Powers did the lion's share of the work, and did it well, but the wickets were hardly suited to his style; with better support he would probably have been even more successful. Hepburn has already received mention, and of the others Gardner (medium right), Fleuret (slow left), and Crowe (fast medium right) were most suc-Gardner and Fleuret both bowled well on occasions, and with more attention to length should do well next year. Kirkpatrick bowled a lazy-looking but useful leg-break, which, though very expensive, might have been made more use of. The fielding was satisfactory, Logan, Fleuret, Kirkpatrick, Powers, and Philby being the pick of a useful lot. Coleby behind the wickets was seen to more advantage on slow pitches than on fast ones. With Gardner, Fleuret, Kirkpatrick, Rawlings, Walters, Hepburn and Philby left over, the prospects for next year are by no means discouraging.

The T.B. Shield was won by Rigaud's, who defeated Grant's somewhat easily at the finish, though the latter had to play under great disadvantages, and in the final easily

disposed of Homeboarders, who had beaten Ashburnham after a good match. The T.BB. and K.SS. match was drawn, Logan adding another to his list of centuries.

A word of praise is due to Elson for his care of the ground, the wickets throughout the

season being excellent.

Coleby played by far the best innings, and was unluckily caught at point in hitting to leg. Crowe, after hitting a 6, was caught off the seventh ball of the first over. Logan, Rawlings, and Walters of the rest made runs. M.C.C., thanks to a good innings of 51 by Rawlin, totalled 140, Powers taking four wickets for 32, Crowe three for 51, Gardner three for 21. Edwards played a slow innings of 23, but nobody else did much.

On going in again the School at first looked to be good for a much better score, but were eventually all out for 108. The first wicket fell at 42, Crowe doing all the scoring. Coleby was bowled for 8. Crowe was out at 47; his innings was a very pretty one, his cutting and off driving being very good. The rest did nothing except Logan, who was last out for 42—a very sound innings. He gave no chance, and succeeded where all others failed. Huish's wicket-

## Obituary.

WE record with much regret the death of the Bishop of Brechin. Hugh Willoughby Jermyn was born in 1820, and was five years at Westminster. He went to Trinity Hall and was ordained in 1843. In 1854 he became an Archdeacon in the West Indies, and from 1858 to 1870 was Rector of Nettlecombe. He was appointed Bishop of Colombo in 1871, and soon after his return in 1875 Bishop of Brechin. In 1886 he succeeded Bishop Eden, also a Westminster, in the Primacy of Scotland, but in 1901 advancing years obliged him to resign it. He kept his bishopric till his death on September 17. He was twice married. His eldest son was elected to Christ Church in 1864.

WE have also to regret the death of Mr. KEDGWIN ELLIOT KAYE GOUGH, who was at the School in 1865, and was afterwards a Principal Clerk in the Board of Trade.

DEAR SIR,—May I call attention to the regrettable lack of interest in the gymnasium which now prevails in the School? The numbers have greatly decreased in the past few years, especially in the evening classes. Indeed, many new boys are

a long time before they learn of its existence. No expense was spared in the building of the gymnasium and in the fitting of the apparatus, but unfortunately this has been to a great extent allowed to go out of repair. At present the place resembles a ship being spoilt for a ha'p'orth of tar. The roof is especially strongly built to allow for the weight of apparatus, most of which has now disappeared. The lighting has lately been much improved by the introduction of incandescent burners, but a great many improvements in other ways are badly needed. The most crying want is that of washing apparatus, which at present is nil. The boxing and fencing classes also suffer from want of new fittings and from smallness of attendance. Five or six years ago the evening gymnastic classes were four or five times as large as they are now, all the boarding-houses sending large detachments. These have now dwindled to an average of about two apiece. Could not a rule be made that all new boarders should go to the gymnasium at least twice a week during Occupation for their first Play and Lent terms? All those who showed promise would probably stay on after this time, and a great deal of talent now neglected would be brought forward in this way. If this plan were adopted the School might hope to make a better show at Aldershot in a few years. Perhaps also more notice might be taken of the gymnasium in The Elizabethan, and improvements in the apparatus and the like might be recorded. This would be sure to increase the general interest taken in the gymnasium. The present sergeant is an excellent teacher, but it is hopeless to expect any great improvement in the gymnastics of the School until the attendance is considerably increased. I must apologise for occupying so much of your valuable space, and Yours, &c., D. S. ROBERTSON.
