THE CRICKET SEASON OF 1913.

MATCHES PLAYED 14: WON 8; LOST 6.

WHATEVER test we choose to apply to the past cricket season cannot fail to place it as one of the most satisfactory of recent years. Interesting matches for the average spectator, good keen cricket for the carping critic, a preponderance of wins over losses for the lover of statistics, and a never-to-be-forgotten victory over Charterhouse for the members of the XI. Disappointments we had, it is true, notably defeat in the first school match with Radley, which is not to be explained away by the strangeness of the ground, as no wicket could

have been more like a genuine Vincent Square wicket, but must be put down to no other cause than bad batting, as indeed may the loss of the matches against the Oxford Authentics and Mr. Day's XI. In the other three matches that we lost, to the Household Brigade, the Free Foresters, and the I. Z., we were in each instance beaten by a far superior side. However, against these six defeats we can claim victories over Charterhouse, M.C.C., Sussex Martlets, Incogniti, Christ Church, Eton Ramblers, Old Westminsters, and Old Wykehamists. It is quite true that the two last-named, as is sometimes bound to be the case with Old Boy teams, were rather weak in bowling, but even so, it was a fine performance to get 278 against the



Wykehamists in two and half hours, and to beat the O.W.W. by 10 wickets on a slow pitch; and to prove that the other sides defeated were not short of good bowling, we need only mention that Mead and Reeves were playing for the M.C.C., N. J. Holloway for the Sussex Martlets, S. J. Pegler and A. F. Morcom for the Incogniti, and J. A. C. Sandeman for the Eton Ramblers, while the Charterhouse bowling was probably better than it has been for some years: which gives us reason to congratulate ourselves not only on the season's results, but on the quality of our cricket.

Individually Rudd, though at the top neither of the batting nor the bowling averages, was the outstanding figure. Although his batting average is lower than last year, he was undoubtedly a better player, equally forcible, sounder and more stable, and his bowling also improved greatly in steadiness. He set a splendid example to his team on the field and off, was always looking for chances, always anxious to go out to win his matches, always ready to throw his wicket away when the interests of the side demanded it, and frequently—be it whispered—on other occasions too. If he can restrain this impetuosity and get rid of his one bad shot which consists of hanging the bat rather limply, without showing the full face of it, at the off-turner and results in turning the ball into the wicket, he ought to develop into a very fine cricketer. Cobbold, as last year, carried off the bowling honours. It would not be going too far to say that he is probably the best slow-medium school-boy bowler that has been seen for many years, and the better the batsman opposed to him the better he seemed to bowl. As a batsman he has a beautiful style but was disappointing in the number of runs he scored. McCulloch headed the batting averages and is an extremely sound bat. His style is somewhat stiff and angular, but he keeps a very straight bat and a very cool head; he was in great form at the end of the term. Kann was frankly disappointing, and though he played a few useful innings, never touched the form of which we know him to be capable. Hurst-Brown was as steady as ever and his defence was frequently invaluable.

Veitch was at his best on slow wickets, his back-play being at present his strong point; with increased strength and experience he should be worth a lot of runs next year, a remark which may also be applied to Charlton, who frequently showed most satisfactory form. Carless kept wicket pluckily at the beginning of the season, but was afterwards supplanted by Bovey, who gained his place by superior batting. The change bowlers, Feasey and Thompson, did useful work and showed at Radley that they were quite capable of batting well on occasions. Pink got the last place, and his hitting was frequently of use. The fielding, uncertain at the start of the season, was very satisfactory in the later matches. Hurst-Brown, McCulloch, Kann, Veitch, Cobbold, and Rudd all deserve mention, their catching being particularly good.

Next year only Veitch, Feasey, Charlton, and Thompson will be left of this successful side. The outlook is not particularly promising, but we trust that all the young ones coming on will benefit by the example set by Rudd and his team last term, and attack their task with courage and enthusiasm. Little has been said about the Charterhouse match as it already has been fully dealt with in a previous number; but the manner of that victory, no less than the victory itself, ought to put heart into Westminster cricket for many years to come.

## CAMP, 1913.

THIS year, for the first time for several summers, there were three camps of the O.T.C. (Junior Division), at Tidworth, at Aldershot, and at Rugeley, in Staffordshire. It was to this latter place that we were sent, and though some of us disliked the prospect, there can be little doubt that most of us changed our minds before camp ended. The weather was good, if at times a little hot, the manœuvre ground varied, and the staff, drawn from the staff of the R.M.C., Sandhurst, excellent in every way. Westminster were in No. 1 Battalion under Major Daly, with Capt. Lawrence as Adjutant. No Officers could have been pleasanter or better instructors, and no Officers could have been more deservedly popular with all. A rough outline of the week's work is given below.

Wednesday, July 30.—Work confined to manœuvring under individual company Commanders. The dullest day spent in camp.

Thursday, July 31.—No. 1 Battalion did outposts near Beaudesert Park. Most of the Company got exercise and instruction. The rest spent a pleasant morning in the sun on the side of a heather-clad hill.

Friday, August 1.—Practised an attack on a flagged enemy. The O.C. when gallantly leading a rush, put his foot in a hole and fell headlong, which did not improve his temper. The morning ended with an assault, but a charge up-hill under a hot sun proved very unattractive to most. In the afternoon the Battalion was inspected by the Brigadier, Col. Wolley-Dod.

Saturday, August 2.—Field operations by the whole Brigade in Beaudesert Park. Westminster formed part of a detached force sent to seize a hill on the flank of the enemy's position. In this we were successful, and from that position we were able to give valuable covering fire for the advance of the rest of our force. Incidentally we found it a very restful occupation after rather a long march. The operations were witnessed by Sir Charles Douglas, Inspector-General of the Home Forces, who expressed great pleasure at the improvement in the O.T.C. since he had first seen it.

Sunday.—Church Parade at 10 and inspection



of the Brigade by the Brigadier. We were lucky enough to be inspected first, as our lines were the front of No. 1 Battalion.

Monday.—Marched out to the area on which we were to do night operations, and surveyed the ground roughly. Practised a retirement not very successfully, and marched home early. In the evening went out to same area and did night outposts. We were not attacked, but we learnt how difficult it is to work at night in a wood with no obvious paths or means of communication. Half of our company was employed as an attacking force, and got much exercise.

Tuesday.—The Battalion practised an advance-guard along a road, ending in an attack on a flagged enemy, followed by a retirement. The work on the whole was good, but our leading sections were unfavourably criticised for slowness in extending and for not making use of cover when it was available.

Wednesday.—The final day was devoted to Brigade operations, but our force proved rather too quick for the enemy, and just as things were getting warm for us, the cease-fire sounded, so that it was not as interesting as some of the other days.

We furnished a guard on the first and on the second Wednesday of camp. The first was creditable, but we were without the College contingent; the second was excellent, and was described by the Adjutant as being a fitting ending to an excellent camp, and no praise could be higher. One is glad to think that the few who go to camp worthily maintain the reputation of the School so far as they can, but so long as the Corps is content to send a bare half of its numbers, the reputation of Westminster among other schools will not be as high as it should be. And it must be remembered that it is in camp that a school's reputation is very largely made amongst the boys, if not amongst masters or parents. One must, therefore, appeal to everyone in the Corps to regard it a duty to come to camp, unless he is prevented by bad health. No one pretends that camp is one long day of enjoyment. There is, no doubt, much that is not attractive and much hard work, but on the other side, there are the pleasant evenings, the sing-song, the general feeling of good-fellowship amongst boys and officers, and last and not least, the knowledge that one has earned the rest of one's holidays, and that one has done something to maintain the honour of what we are proud to think is one of the greatest of schools.
