RETIRING COLLECTION

Waterford Kamhlaba, United World College of Southern Africa, Swaziland was founded by the late Michael Stern in 1963. From small beginnings the school has risen to a position of prominence; first set against the iniquity of apartheid, it now has an outstanding record of academic achievement and service to the community. The collection today is to support Waterford's community service role which makes an important contribution to the people of Swaziland assisting in a range of projects including hospital orphan care, vision and hearing for primary students, working with juvenile offenders, community housing and child rescue work. This July two Westminster Sixth Formers are staying at Waterford for a month and they will be part of the school's community service role as well as benefiting from the personal growth experience that Waterford offers. The efforts of Waterford Kamhlaba (Siswati for "of the world", meaning a world in miniature) are so important in one of the poorest countries and one most deeply affected by HIV/AIDS. Nelson Mandela said, "Through the generosity of others, my children and grandchildren enjoyed the benefits of a Waterford education".
