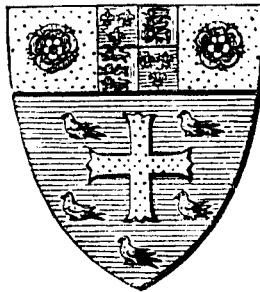

In 1851, the first cricket match, Charterhouse *v.* Westminster, was played, but not until 1865 was it instituted as an annual fixture. This year's match completed the fiftieth consecutive match against our rivals, and therefore it seems fitting to give a list of the Grantite Pinks since that date.

A great difficulty has arisen in doing this as several Grantites were afterwards "up College." The only means of overcoming it is by including their names in the lists and placing an asterisk before it.

As far as can be discovered in ledgers and records these are for the most part correct.

SENIORS.

In the first round of cricket Seniors, Grant's played Home-Boarders. Grant's won the toss and elected to bat on a plumb wicket. D. G. Veitch and C. M. Sankey opened the innings to the bowling of A. C. Feasey and N. F. Furze. The Grantite scoring was very consistent and the innings closed for 229, C. M. Sankey being top scorer with a steady 42. H.B.B. fared disastrously, and no one except Furze (48) could offer any resistance to the

Grantite attack. H.B.B.'s total only realised 92, which necessitated a follow on. Another disastrous start ensued, but A. C. Feasey coming to the rescue, hit hard all round the wicket for a brilliant 93. He received invaluable help from Pulvertaft and Brookman, both of whom showed great restraint, and the total closed for 163. E. L. Hodgson bowled well for Grant's, taking nine wickets for 45 runs in the second innings. Grant's knocked off the runs for the loss of Sankey's wicket and so won by nine wickets.

FINAL.

GRANT'S *v.* A.H.H.

This match was played up-fields on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, July 14th and 15th. A.H.H. won the toss and elected to bat on a plumb wicket, E. L. Hodgson and H. B. Thacker sharing the Grantite bowling. With 21 on the board J. H. Strain left, being l.b.w. to Hodgson. Four runs later Carless was clean bowled in trying to put a "yorker" over square leg's head. Radermacher and Pite put on 30 runs, but after that no one except H. D. Carless did anything. Pite's innings was most useful, but very lucky, being missed twice before he had made fifty. Thacker dismissed the last three batsmen in one over, and the innings closed for 164.

Grant's had an hour's batting before the drawing of stumps. In forty minutes H. B. Thacker and D. G. Veitch had taken the score to 100 for the first wicket, when H. B. Thacker was well caught in the deep.

D. G. Veitch continued to bat well, at the close of play being 80 not out, and the total 132 for two wickets. The next day, Grant's hit the bowling all over the field, D. G. Veitch staying until he had made 141. His cutting and driving were superb. Both Longton and Hodgson gave him excellent support, Hodgson especially hitting with great power, made his 65 in about 30 minutes. With the score at 375 for nine wickets, D. G. Veitch declared. This time A.H.H. never looked like making many runs. H. A. Carless and Radermacher being the only two to reach double figures. Two wickets were down for 48 and the whole side for 68. F. R. Oliver bowled well for Grant's, taking five wickets for 11 runs. Grant's thus won by an innings and 143 runs.

C. M. Sankey, a good left-handed batsman with a nice shot through the covers. Would do better if he watched the ball more carefully.

E. J. Longton, a much improved batsman but inclined to hit too soon. A good field at third man.

F. R. Oliver, a good medium bowler and a steady bat. Must improve in his catching.

G. B. Gardiner ought to be a good batsman, but never seems to make runs. Must improve his fielding.

R. Smith, a good batsman, but rather handicapped by injuries. Keeps wicket and has been known to bowl.

H. S. Todd, a fair medium bowler and bat, with a nice shot past point. Captained Juniors successfully.

S. H. Spence, a fair bat and a good field. Made a century against Rigaud's in Juniors.

R. M. Blundell would do better as a bat if he hit out more. Should be useful to the House in future.

DEATHS.

We regret to have to announce the deaths of three Old Grantites. Frederick James Julius Bandinel was admitted "up" the House in 1861. He left in 1863 and went to Oriel College, Oxford. He spent most of his life in China, where he had an adventurous life. A few years ago he re-visited Westminster and Grant's for the first time for many years. The writer recalls the pleasure with which he found his name in Chiswick's. He died some months ago.

A contemporary of his, David Archer Vaughan Colt-Williams, died on April 21st. He was admitted in 1861 and elected into College in 1864, going up to Oxford in 1868. He was called to the Bar in 1877. His son was recently in College.

We also regret to record the death of Eustace Hepburn Barlow, who was up Grant's from 1867-71. He was afterwards a land agent, and died on May 29th.
