WESTMINSTER WORTHIES.

ONCE more we come before our readers under this old heading. We do so without apology, for we feel that we are fully justified. Below will be found the last instalment of those lists of Old Westminsters which have been appearing with more or less regularity in the 'Elizabethan' for the last three years. It was in June 1901 that the idea of collecting the names of all Old Westminsters from the 'Dictionary of National Biography' was first formulated. After four lists of gradually decreasing length had appeared, the burst of energy apparently failed. At all events we meet with no more Westminster Worthies until June 1907, when an article appeared expressing the intention of carrying the vast work to its completion. As a proof of its bona fides, it contained a list of names omitted

from the previous lists and a further addition of some dozen names. Since then, the author of that article, assisted by others, has devoted an enormous amount of time and labour to fulfilling his intention. To them alone is it due that the final list is now appearing. On such an occasion they are clearly more fitted to speak than we are. Before we append the names, therefore, we quote a few lines.

"Now that the list of 'Westminster Worthies' is finished, the compilers venture to make a brief explanation of their method and purpose. In both they have acted merely as pioneers. The list does not profess to be drawn from original sources; it is frankly second-hand; and as such cannot pretend in any way to completeness. Beginning in a spirit of personal curiosity, the compilers have gone on in the hope that their work might serve as a rough outline which others more fitted than themselves for the task might fill in. One appeal they would make to all Old Westminsters: whatever knowledge they may possess of the School's past history, not to treasure

it up, but to communicate it to the proper authorities at once. The longer any problems of this kind are left unsifted, the less chance they have ever to be solved. And the sole way of sifting them is to state them boldly, and let their truth or falsehood be tested in the open light of criticism."

HAKLUYT MEMORIAL.

On July 7 a tablet was unveiled in Bristol Cathedral in honour of Richard Hakluyt, for many years Prebendary there. He came to Westminster in 1564, and, after becoming a Queen's Scholar, was elected to Christ Church in 1570. He was afterwards Archdeacon of Westminster from 1602 till his death in 1616. The memorial, which consisted of an inscribed tablet of white Carrara marble on a background of polished Sienna marble, was

placed in the North Aisle of the Cathedral. were present at the ceremony the Dean and Canons of Bristol and representatives of various bodies connected with or interested in Hakluyt. Among them was Sir Clements Markham, representing the Royal Geographical Society, while the School was represented by the Captain. Dr. Duckworth, who was to have been present on behalf of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster, was unavoidably prevented. After the unveiling, Sir Clements Markham delivered a lecture in the Chapter House on Hakluyt's life and work.

THE FIELDS.

WESTMINSTER SCHOOL v. I ZINGARI.

This match was played at Vincent Square on Saturday, June 4, and won by the School by 24 runs.

Rawson won the toss and elected to bat on an easy and fast wicket. The batting was opened by Rawson (H.) and Goodall, and was opposed to the bowling of Macpherson of Cluny and Hon. R. Anson. Both the batsmen seemed at home, and 54 was on the board for the first wicket, Goodall being caught at mid-on. Rawson was next out for a useful 44, attempting a big hit, having played a faultless innings; Hammond played a hard hitting innings of 31, but both these scores were overshadowed by Rudd's excellent 72 not out; Rudd hit well all round the wicket and never looked like getting out—his placing was quite the feature of the match. The School's innings closed for 237.

The visitors sent in De Trafford and Hon. R. Anson, who were opposed to the bowling of Clarke and Goodall. Clarke bowled Anson in his first over with a short one, which the latter tried to pull. E. H. Crake played a useful innings of 62, although he gave one chance to Goodall when at 20; he played bright enterprising cricket, forcing the pace throughout. Leaf and Webbe at one time looked as though they would pull the match off, but Webbe was caught, when they had put on 40. The I Zingari innings closed for 213.

Goodall and Rawson put on 100 for the first wicket when Goodall was run out for 42. Hammond and Rudd quickly fell, but Clarke on joining Rawson helped to pile on the score. Rawson was eventually well stumped for 104. Wood on joining Clarke

WESTMINSTER v. CHARTERHOUSE.

THIS annual match was played at Charterhouse on Friday and Saturday, July 1 and 2, and resulted in a draw. The result was a disappoint-ment to both sides, as each in turn seemed to have the game in their hands. If the rain had not come at the beginning of the Charterhouse second innings. Westminster would have stood a good chance of winning, and but for the downpour at 6 o'clock Charterhouse would probably have had little difficulty in hitting off the necessary runs.

Charterhouse won the toss but decided to field, and at 11.45 Rawson and Goodall faced the bowling of King and Hudson. Runs came very slowly, and the score was only 3 when Goodall was bowled by King. Rain then came on and there was no further play before lunch. After lunch play was still impossible, and further rain put an end to

cricket for the day.

On Saturday, shortly after 10 o'clock, Rawson and Hammond went in to bat. Runs came fairly steadily, but on Leatham being put on, Hammond was caught at square leg. He had made some nice shots but had been missed twice shortly before he was out. Rudd, though occasionally in difficulties, played an attractive innings and helped Rawson to take the score to 64 before the latter was bowled by Shortt, who had gone on for Leatham. Clarke did not stay long, and after an interval due to a heavy shower, wickets fell rapidly. Rudd was well caught by Dowling, R. Rawson ran himself out, and Wood was caught in the deep. No one else except Slubicki looked like staying in, and the innings closed for 95.

The Charterhouse innings proved even briefer. Morrison and Sanderson started well, but the latter was favoured with some luck, R. Rawson missing him twice off somewhat difficult chances. Clarke at first was unable to find a length, but when he did he quickly disposed of Charterhouse. bowled Morrison with the score at 20, and four runs later he dismissed Boosey. Norris and Sanderson made a short stand, but with the score at 44 Sanderson was bowled by Clarke and shortly afterwards Goodall disposed of Norris. The same bowler cleverly caught and bowled Denison, and Clarke obtained the remaining five wickets in rapid succession. The excellence of his bowling may be judged by the fact that after taking his first wicket he had only 6 runs knocked off him; altogether he took 8 wickets for 36 runs.

Rawson and Goodall again opened the innings for Westminster. The latter was soon caught and bowled by Hudson, a most excellent catch, which the bowler succeeded in making only by throwing himself on the ground. Hammond was quickly out leg before, while Rudd, who followed, was stumped. Clarke, after making a couple of good hits, was bowled by Hudson. H. Rawson, who had played a steady game, shortly after foolishly

ran himself out. Neither R. Rawson nor Wood stopped long. Gilmour made one or two nice shots, but the innings quickly closed for 90, Slubicki, who had played well, being again not out.

Charterhouse were thus left two hours in which to make 117. Morrison and Sanderson started the Charterhouse innings, but before twenty runs were scored, a heavy shower caused an adjournment. On resuming, Westminster were at a disadvantage, as the ball was slippery and the bowlers could not get a foothold, while the wicket played easier. However, just as the Charterhouse pair seemed nicely settled, a very heavy downpour made any further play impossible, and the match, which might have afforded a most exciting finish, was left drawn.

The fielding on both sides was good, Charterhouse being the smarter at picking up the ball, but Westminster the more accurate at returning it. Morrison proved an efficient wicket-keeper for Charterhouse, while H. Rawson stopped some difficult balls on the leg side with considerable

skill.

ORATIONS.

THE third and final trial took place on Friday, June 17, and resulted in favour of Codd after a very close contest. The passage set was Isaiah, xiii. 19-xiv. 23, a prediction of the fall of Babylon. Walpole, who recited first, began with a sing-song intonation, and was very incorrect, but improved greatly in the latter part of the piece. Feasey, who has a very pleasant voice, was incorrect and too monotonous. Murray spoke too fast and was rather indistinct this time; he made three verbal slips. Hake is a decidedly good reciter, but his memory failed him once, and two judges out of the three preferred Codd's performance on other grounds. Codd is as good a reciter as Hake, with a sweeter voice, and on this occasion he was absolutely 'word-perfect.' He was at times too quiet, and gave the impression of reading rather than speaking, but on the whole he did well and deserved the prize.

O.T.C.

An account of the work in the two previous terms has already appeared in The ELIZABETHAN.

During this term a great deal of attention has been paid to the training of candidates for the Certificate 'A' Examination. Several ordinary parades were devoted to working with Advanced and Rear Guards and to telling-off Outposts. Many voluntary parades were held in the early morning for training candidates in handling a Company in Close Order drill and in Skirmishing.

The Corps were invited by the War Office to furnish a party of seventy-five Cadets to assist in lining the streets on the occasion of the funeral of his late Majesty King Edward. Extra parades were held, and much trouble was taken in practising the Funeral Exercise. At the last moment the invitations to the various contingents of the Officers' Training Corps were withdrawn. In consequence of this change in plans a small party consisting of the Commanding Officer and the five senior Sergeants represented the Corps at the Funeral, and had a position on Horse Guards' Parade.

The inspection at Vincent Square on July 8 was conducted by Capt. A. G. Egerton, Coldstream Guards, Adjutant of the University of London O.T.C. (attached to the Imperial General Staff, War Office).

The General Salute and March Past were well carried out. The Company Drill was very good. Very few mistakes were made, and, except on one or two occasions, the marching and the dressing

were admirable.

An Attack in two lines was well done. The Section and Squad Commanders showed that they knew their work, and kept their men well in hand,

both in the rushes and in firing.

Capt. Egerton addressed the Cadets at the close of the Inspection, and praised their work. He expressed the hope that Cadets would not allow their training to be wasted, but would, when they left school, take commissions in some

branch of His Majesty's Forces.

The work of the Corps has been more ambitious during this year than in previous years. More time has been devoted to Field Work and to Firing Exercises; and some attempt has been made to train Non-Commissioned Officers. As has been explained above, many opportunities have been given to Cadets to prepare themselves for the Certificate 'A' Examination. In addition to having practice in handling troops, Cadets can attend lectures on the subjects of the Examination. It is hoped that the methods of training Non-Commissioned Officers will be much improved next year. Further efforts will be made to improve the Field Training of the Corps.

Some changes in administration have been made during the year; but only in one case, that of the Shooting VIII., need any explanation be

given.

In past years the VIII. has had range practice at Staines on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, and has stayed at Bisley for three days before the Ashburton Shield Day. Experience has shown that under these circumstances the expenses of the VIII. amount in one term to at least two-thirds of the Corps' total income for the year, in spite of the generous gifts of the Elizabethan Club and the payment of travelling expenses by the boys themselves. These range practices do not benefit more than twelve boys; and there are many other activities which make demands on the money of the Corps. It would not be right to ask for further contributions from the boys, as even now several boys are prevented from shooting by the heavy travelling expenses.

It was therefore decided to restrict range practice to Wednesdays, and not to allow Cadets

to stay at Bisley.

But it must not be supposed that the VIII. has been starved in consequence of these changes. All the match rifles were carefully tested and repaired before the season began. New sights were

added to the rifles at considerable cost (through the kindness of several friends of the School); and every effort has been made to render the rifles thoroughly reliable. The range accommodation at Staines and at Bisley has not been limited in any way; and the ammunition provided has been the best obtainable. Only the ignorant would suppose that these arrangements could be made without considerable expense. Although much reduced, the cost of match shooting has again amounted to a large sum.

Nor has the VIII. been neglected in respect of personal service. Through the introduction of some personal friends, the Officers have been able to secure the services of Mr. W. Gray, of the London Scottish, a well-known shot, as coach to the team. Mr. Gray has very kindly given up his time to this work; and his advice has been of great value. On every occasion of range practice at least one Officer has gone with the VIII. to help in the work and to look after their interests.

If the performances of our team on Ashburton day are improved in the future, it will not be by reckless expenditure on ammunition and targets, but by making better use of the opportunities provided, and by more careful practice and training before going to the range. Such practice can be obtained on a miniature range and on the sub-target machine, if properly used.

Before closing this account of the Corps work, it would be well to mention that nearly eighty Cadets are going to camp (as compared with forty-one last year), and that through the kindness of the Earl of Radnor, two extra days will be spent in camp in the Park at Longford, near Salisbury.

Dear Sir,—I was astounded to read in the June number of The Elizabethan, 'The King's Scholars proper sat in the Sacrarium. For the non-resident K.SS. and the Town Boys places were kept at the west end of the Nave.' I should like to know what justification there is for casting this slur on the status of the non-resident K.SS. It will, I am sure, be keenly felt by all of us who once were King's Scholars, although we did not live up College. While I was at the School, the resident K.SS. always did their best to make us feel that we did not belong to the foundation, but I think this is the first time that the authorities have made any distinction. It cannot be allowed to pass without a protest.

Of course, you may say that we were there on the same status as a few of the Senior Town Boys, who somehow obtained places with us in the Triforium; but then you will have to explain further how it was that we received the official invitation and were given the Coronation medal, while the Town Boys

present received neither of these.

Perhaps it would be as well to add that on previous occasions, e.g. the funeral of the late Duke of Cambridge, when the K.SS. had seats in the Sacrarium, while the Town Boys were in the Nave, all the K.SS. were together.
