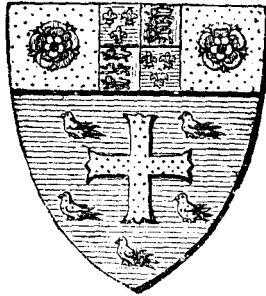

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## THE PAST YEAR.

It is again our duty to chronicle the doings of Grants during the past year. In the junior football House Matches we succumbed to College, who were allowed to enter for the first time, by 5-0. We then qualified for the final in the Trials by defeating H.B.B. by 6-1, but had to lower our colours before Rigauds, who were very strong. As usual, Moon won the yard-ties, and his lucky partners this time were E. C. Stevens and Baillie. The Play Supper went off very well on the second night of the Play, and many well-known old Grantites were present. Nothing else of any importance occurred till the Shield matches at the end of Lent term. We beat Ashburnham easily by 5-2, but again had to own defeat before the strong combination of Rigauds, this time by the large margin of nine goals to nil, as we had no Kirkpatrick to break up the attacks. There were no yard-ties that term, and, since there were not any school fives-ties or racquet-ties, for some unaccountable reason, Grants were unable to make themselves conspicuous in that line of sport. We carried off four firsts and two seconds in the Sports, which was about as good as we

expected, and we had also two representatives, Pain and Bompas, in the winning League team. We had our revenge on College this term, in the Juniors, for beating us at football, by defeating them by nine wickets. The final is not yet played off. For the first time for a great many years Grants were not in the final for the Shield matches at cricket. This is chiefly to be accounted for by our being drawn against Rigauds, who are exceptionally strong, in the first round, Grants suffering defeat by 10 wickets. This match was productive of some good scores, Fox, Moon, and Day making 30 or more for Grants, and Blaker (twice), More, and Beasley for Rigauds. The arrangements of Grants will be somewhat complicated next term, as we shall have Rigauds for our visitors, while the re-building is going on next door. We wish all success to future Grantites, and look to them to regain the cricket shield next season.

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#### HOUSE NOTES.

In the team of the XXII. *v.* the School, Grants had three representatives, viz. :—A. P. Day, S. L. T. Taswell, and H. G. H. Barnes. Day made the top score of 27 for his side.

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The only additions to Grants this term were J. L. Johnston (boarder) and Pen Gaskell (half-boarder). H. B. Templer left last term.

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We congratulate H. B. Templer on getting his Pink-and-Whites, and W. H. Lonsdale his 3rd XI.'s last term.

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In the Sports, Grants were fairly successful last term, gaining four firsts and two seconds. Moon won the hammer, W. R. Stevens the 100 yards under 16, and second in the quarter-mile under 16, E. C. Stevens the 300 yards under 14, Daniel the cricket ball under 15, and Bompas second in the half-mile handicap.

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We were glad to see L. J. Moon playing for Corinthians on their Easter tour.

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We are also pleased to see a Grantite captaining the winners of the form-cup this term.

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Pain and Bompas were among the winners of the League.

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In the School Concert this term H. V. Anthony (O.G.) contributed a very pretty violin solo, while M. G. Baillie rendered a pianoforte solo very well. The latter was the only representative of Grants among the performers. This is strange, as Grantites, as a rule, have a remarkable aptitude for music.

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We congratulate L. J. Moon on gaining the splendid batting average of 47 for 607 runs for the School.

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Grants will have four representatives for Town Boys on Election Monday, viz. :—L. J. Moon, W. F. Fox, S. L. Taswell, and A. P. Day.

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## JUNIOR HOUSE MATCHES.

### SEMI-FINAL.

#### GRANTS v. COLLEGE.

This match was begun on June 8th, and resulted in an easy victory for Grants by nine wickets. College won the toss and went in first, Gwyer and Lonsdale facing the bowling of Taswell and Collins. The start was very bad, as two wickets fell for three runs, and four men were out when only 13 runs had been scored. Eustace, however, played well for 19, while Clay and Bernays reached double figures. No one else did anything, and the innings closed for 66. Taswell bowled splendidly, taking seven wickets for 23 runs. Day and Stevens started the Grantite innings and scored 17 before the latter was caught and bowled. Taswell and Barnes helped to raise the score to 53 for three wickets, but no one after that offered any resistance to the

bowling except Lonsdale, and Grants found themselves only six runs ahead of their opponents. Day was top scorer with a useful but rather lucky innings of 27. Cotterill bowled well for College, capturing five wickets for 22. Of College's second innings there is little to say. No one but Reynolds offered the slightest resistance to the bowling of Taswell and Stevens, who both bowled splendidly, and they were all out for a paltry total of 20, leaving Grants only 15 to win. This they obtained for the loss of Taswell's wicket, leaving Grants the winners as above stated. Score and analysis:—

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## SHIELD MATCHES.

GRANTS *v.* RIGAUDS.

This match was begun "Up Fields," on Wednesday, July 1st, and ended in a win for Rigauds by 10 wickets. On Grants winning the toss, Moon and Day went to the wicket, to oppose the bowling of More and Berens. Disaster soon followed, as Moon was bowled by a good ball from Berens without scoring, and Taswell left with only 15 runs on the board. On Fox joining Day, however, quite a different complexion was put on the game, and in less than half an hour 55 runs were added to the score, when Fox was caught and bowled by Blaker, who had gone on vice Berens, for a hard-hit innings of 26. Day was the next to leave, having scored a useful innings of 30. The rest did absolutely nothing except Lonsdale, who made 13, and the innings closed for 112. Blaker and Beasley then started the Rigaudite innings, and the former immediately scored freely off the deliveries of Fox. At 34 Beasley was run out, having only compiled 6 of the number, and Blaker was eventually caught at the wicket for a hard-hit innings of 43, made out of 58 put on during his stay. The long stand of the innings was made by More and Willett, who, while together, added 64 runs to the score. The

former compiled a fine score of 60, while Willett played carefully for a useful 29. Both were dismissed by Moon, who took off his pads and gloves, in order to try to effect a separation. After their dismissal, Lord offered a good deal of resistance to the bowling, and carried his bat for 19. Moon's analysis of 4 wickets for 29 was very good. The second venture was then started by Grants, and Day was out in the first over. Moon and Taswell, however, scored fast, and both were getting well set, when at 38 the latter was unfortunately given out for a catch off his pad-straps. A lengthy stand was then made by Moon and Fox, and it was not till the score had been taken to 116 that a separation was effected, the former leaving for a very good innings of 49. Three more wickets quickly fell, and six were out for 122, but Heard stayed in with Fox, who was playing very well, and made a useful 17. Barnes also helped Fox to add to his score by staying in with him, but the rest did not make a run between them. It is impossible to speak too highly of the innings of Fox, who went in second wicket and was ninth out for a splendid innings of 96, containing a five and 7 fours. But for him, Grants would have fared badly. As it was, Rigauds had to go in again to get 91 to win, and obtained them without the loss of a wicket. Blaker and Beasley were the first pair, and they kept their wickets intact until the match was won by ten wickets. Full score and analysis :—
