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# Historical Notes.

NEITHER Phillimore nor Forshall is quite correct about the Ireland Prizes.

Forshall's Note on p. 434 should run :--

One for the Major (Candidate); one for the Sixth Form and 3rd Election; one for the Shell and Under Elections.

The Fifth did not compete.

1845. Forshall's errata-3. J. Stebbing.

1848. 3. W. Waterfield (as in Forshall).

1849. 3. J. Andrews in Forshall is probably correct, rather than W. C. Macready as in Phillimore. Perhaps the Rev. S. Andrews might be interrogated on the subject, if there is no information in the School Records.

The Slade Prizes, as given in Phillimore, are almost all wrong. Those in Forshall are correct, except that in 1850 W. Waterfield took the 1st Latin Essay, as shown in Phillimore, besides the Greek Iambics.

He gave as an encore this year, 'Long ago in Alcala,' which has proved such a success at many past concerts. The evening ended with the inauguration of the 'Carmen Feriale Westmonasteriense,' written by Mr. Sargeaunt, and set to music by Mr. Piggott. This chorus was full of 'go' from beginning to end, and we hope Mr. Sargeaunt was gratified by the way in which it was received.

It only remains now to thank the O.WW. who gave us their kind help, and contributed so much to the success of the evening; and last, but not least, we are grateful to Mr. J. G. Ranalow, by whose unceasing efforts the concert was raised to such a high pitch of excellence.

## THE FIELDS.

#### WESTMINSTER SCHOOL v. ETON RAMBLERS.

THIS match was played up Fields on Saturday, May 19, and ended in a defeat for the School by 83 runs. The Eton Ramblers, having won the toss, elected to bat, and sent in Williams and Blackett to face the bowling of Hepburn and Edgar. The former, bowling from the far end, was soon successful, and Blackett was dismissed by the second ball of Hepburn's first over. Williams then fell to Edgar, caught by Heaton-Ellis at cover-point, and then O'Brien and Hoare made a determined stand until the former was bowled by Hepburn for 20. Captain Le Gard then joined Hoare, and these two continued to add to the score until Le Gard was dismissed by Hoare soon fell for a well-played 52. Hepburn. A. H. Hoare and Ellis then carried the score to 127, when the former was dismissed, clean bowled by Hepburn for 5. Ellis was soon bowled by Le Blond, and then a determined stand was made by Malcolmson and L. L. Hoare. With these two out, however, the innings soon closed for 219, Hepburn taking 7 wickets for 57. The School sent in Turner and Birchall to face the bowling of Le Gard and Ellis, and both soon succumbed, Turner failing to judge a slow ball from Le Gard and Birchall caught in the slips off Ellis. Rawlings looked like making runs, but after compiling 20 was caught by Williams off Ellis. Edgar was then clean bowled by Ellis, and Gow was hopelessly beaten by Le Gard's slow ball. Hepburn played a dashing innings, and compiled 31 in about twenty minutes. The rest of the side only added 42, and the innings closed for 136. In the second innings the Eton Ramblers scored 92 for the loss of 7 wickets, Turner securing 7 for 48.

#### WESTMINSTER SCHOOL v. R.M.A. WOOLWICH.

This match was played up Fields on Wednesday, May 23, and resulted in a draw. Rawlings won the toss, and sent in Birchall and Hepburn to face the bowling of Peel and Harford. A bad start ensued, Hepburn being clean bowled by a good ball from Peel when the score only stood at 8. Birchall was joined by Turner. These two made a small stand and brought the score up to 20, when Birchall was bowled by Peel. Rawlings then joined Turner, and both batsmen played themselves carefully in, scoring slowly at first, but quickening the pace before lunch. The not-outs at lunch were: Rawlings, 44; Turner, 29.

After lunch both batsmen soon got thoroughly going, Rawlings dealing with the bowling in a very masterful fashion, whilst Turner made some very fine late cuts past third man. Rawlings very quickly reached his 50, and both batsmen continued to play with skill and confidence. In about an hour Rawlings reached his century, and then he began to hit out, and runs came fast. However, at 131 he was bowled in attempting to pull a shooting ball from McNeile.

#### THE ELIZABETHAN.

He had played a fine innings for 131 without giving a chance, and hitting twenty-four 4's. Gow then went in and seemed likely to make some runs, but was unluckily l.b.w. to Peel. Soon after this Turner came out for a fine 57, and when Edgar and Heaton-Ellis had only added 4 and were both out, the innings was declared for 255 for seven. The School started with Hepburn and Turner, while the R.M.A. sent in Dickinson and Robertson. Hepburn was soon successful, for he bowled Dickinson for 2 in his first over. McCleod then joined Robertson, but the latter soon fell to a fine one-hand catch by Circuitt off Turner at square-leg. Boscawen then joined McCleod, but after scoring 15 he was bowled by Turner. Hankin followed, but after a short stand he was caught by Circuitt off Turner. Drayson then came in and soon got going, but when it seemed as if McCleod and he would make a stand the former was bowled by Turner. McNeile did not stay long, and Drayson was joined by Craig, and when the former had made 50 and the latter 20, both not-out, stumps were drawn. Thus the draw was very interesting, Westminster making 255 for seven and the R M.A. making 184 for six wickets.

# WESTMINSTER SCHOOL v M.C.C. AND GROUND.

This match was played up Fields on Wednesday, May 30, and ended in a crushing defeat for West-The School, who batted first, sent in minster. Hepburn and Edgar to oppose the bowling of Wainwright and Douglas, but disasters came almost immediately, Edgar being clean bowled by Douglas and Hepburn being caught off a miss-hit from Wainwright. The pitch was fast, and the ball was inclined to shoot, and no one could make anything of Douglas. The innings closed soon after a quarter past one for 37, Turner playing well for 17 of them. Wainwright took 3 wickets for 13 and Douglas 8 for 18, the latter doing the 'hat trick.' The M.C.C. opened with Hatton and Crawford, and the Westminster total was soon passed without either wicket falling, but at last Hatton was bowled by Reed for 29, and soon afterwards Rawlings bowled Crawford for 46. The innings lasted all the afternoon, and resulted in a total of 246, the best scores being Douglas (49), Crawford (46), Moore (40), Hatton (29), and Borradaile (25).
