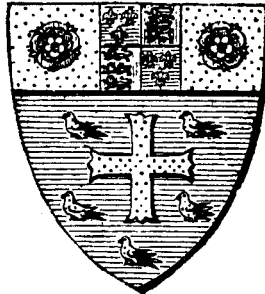

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THE PLAY SUPPER.

GRANTITE GYMNASTIC COMPETITION.

The competition took place on Tuesday, March 24th. The exercises were hard and were made still harder by the fact that there were only five competitors. The start was

made at the ladder where there were two exercises (1) Hand over hand by the spars forwards, (2) Right hand leading forwards. Four exercises at the parallel bars followed, in which Yeld was most conspicuous. Vaulting the horse, climbing, and exercises at the rings were on the whole very well done. At the horizontal bar, Barwell was the only one able to do the upstart and circle satisfactorily. Severn, Woodbridge and Scott failed in most of these. The work was very tiring, as there were sixteen exercises in all, whilst in the school competition, there were only eleven exercises and nine competitors. It was a close contest between Yeld and Barwell, but the former eventually won by $1\frac{1}{2}$ marks. The marks were as follows:—
