KILLED IN ACTION.

CAPTAIN R. E. TANNER, The King's (Liverpool) Regiment, who was the first Grantite to lay down his life for his country, came up Grant's in 1898. He received his first commission in 1905. Captain Tanner was exceedingly popular in his regiment, and his colonel (who was himself killed some weeks later) wrote: "Captain Tanner met his death when leading the van in a magnificent attack on the enemy, who were holding an enormously strong position. The regiment was advance guard to the whole Division, and Captain Tanner and Captain Feneran . . . most gallantly sustained the honour of 'The King's.' Our sorrow at his loss will

consequently be mingled with pride at his most gallant conduct." A short memorial service was held by the Dean on September 26th in St. Faith's Chapel. The following telegram was received by Mr. Tanner:—"The King and Queen deeply regret the loss you and the army have sustained by the death of your son in the service of his country. Their Majesties truly sympathise with you in your sorrow."

- Mr. G. S. Ness, Lieutenant, Royal Scots Fusiliers, was up Grant's from 1900 to 1902.
- Mr. D. D. Philby, Lieutenant, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, was only up Grant's for two years, from 1904 to 1906.
- Mr. G. W. H. Hodgson, Lieutenant, The Border Regiment, was up Grant's from January, 1903, to July, 1907. Mr. Hodgson was the eldest of three brothers who have all been up Grants. He went to Trinity College, Cambridge, and obtained his commission through the University.
- MR. D. S. S. SMURTHWAITE, Lieutenant, The Black Watch, was up Grant's from 1908 to 1911. He will be remembered by not a few present Grantites. His military career, though short, was distinctly brilliant. He obtained a military cadetship, and passed out of Sandhurst at the head of the list. On outbreak of war he was immediately gazetted to the Black Watch.
- Mr. R. DE R. ROCHE, Private, The Queen's Westminster Rifles, was up Grant's from 1894 to 1897. He also served in the South African War.

GRANT'S v. ASHBURNHAM.

Grant's won the toss and started from the Hospital end, pressing immediately. Rain was falling the whole game, and consequently one could hardly describe the play as football.

However, after about twenty minutes play D. G. Veitch scored with one of the simplest "donkey drops" imaginable, the ball slipping through Tenison's hands.

From the re-kick Ashburnham started energetically but could not penetrate our defence, and soon were forced back to undergo a bombardment. Notwithstanding the adversity of the elements to football, the A.HH. backs played well, and it was not until nearly half time that Forster scored from a corner.

Half-time score, 2-0.

In the second half our forwards improved and again subjected their goal to a heavy bombardment, during which Oliver scored at close range. Soon after Andrews added another, 4—0.

At last Thacker was called on to clear, the only time during the match, and passing to Oliver, enabled him to score the last goal of the match.

SENIORS (FINAL).

GRANT'S v. RIGAUD'S.

The Final of Seniors was played against Rigaud's on Friday, December 11th. Grant's were represented by the same team that crushed Ashburnham. Winning the toss, Grant's started off from the Hospital end, and for upwards of quarter of an hour a strenuous and fairly equal game ensued.

Gradually, however, Grant's pressed Rigaud's back and proved their superiority. After several shots and a fruitless corner, first Oliver and then Gardiner got away, but failed to score, Gardiner treading over the ball when well placed. After about twenty minutes play Grant's at length scored through Smith, who with a long low shot completely deceived Rowlands. From the kick-off Grant's at once pressed and forced a corner, which was well placed by Oliver for Croome to register the second point.

After starting again we pressed strongly, forcing several corners which came to no good. Play was entirely in their half. It had been raining continuously now for some time, and consequently the ground was in a bad state, which caused many misshots, and but for these our score would have been much greater. In spite of this our forwards gave a very fine exhibition of passing, at the end of which Gardiner scored, placing the ball far out of Rowlands' reach in the top left-hand corner. After some more energetic play Veitch scored with a shot which Rowlands did not seem to make any great effort to save. A few moments later the whistle blew for half-time, Grant's leading 4—0.

After the start, Andrews, taking a good pass, scored with a low shot. This goal was followed by a series of shots, of which two by Gardiner and Hodgson were the best. About twenty minutes from the end Veitch again scored with a good long shot, and immediately after the kick-off Hodgson and Hewins, who were now backing up, caused Rigaud's goal to go through a perfect hurricane of shots. From one of Hodgson's shots Rowlands made a magnificent save at the expense of a corner, but a few minutes later the former scored with a good long shot. Some varied play now ensued, but the score was not increased by either side. Thacker, in goal, had not much to do. Their forwards rarely got over the half-way line, and so did not cause our defence much trouble. Result: Grant's won 7—0.

CRITICISMS.

E. L. Hodgson, a very safe and steady back, and quite one of the best the School has possessed for a long time. (Knows the tricks of the trade.)

- **D. G. Veitch** has played regularly for the School at centre-half. Played well in Seniors; tackles well and uses his head to advantage. In passing, as he is always being told, he is apt to lift the ball too much.
- R. Smith has played regularly for the School at left-half. Though still handicapped by neuritis, he played well in Seniors and has much improved his kicking, and is now good with his head.
- **H. B. Thacker** has kept goal regularly for the School. Though new to his place he met with very fair success, bringing off some very good saves. Had absolutely nothing to do in Seniors.
- J. H. Spence has played regularly for the School; he tackles well and can use his head, but is rather inexperienced.
- **F. Oliver** has played for the School as outside-left; considering he is really an outside-right he has played quite well.
- G. B. Gardiner, a much improved forward in every respect; passes well, and is a good shot.
- M. G. Hewins played well in Seniors and has improved his kicking since last year, but still lacks pace.
- **F. R. Forster** has improved, and making good use of his pace, played well in Seniors. Should be useful to the House in the future.
- M. P. Andrews played quite well in Seniors at outside-left; though slow, he managed fairly well.
- V. Croome, at inside-left, though new to the place, he combined quite well. His size handicaps him greatly.
