GRANTS v RIGAUDS.

This match was played on Friday, November 29th, and resulted in a victory of Rigauds, by four goals to three. Willett kicked off from the "Church" end, about 2.40 p.m. Rigauds immediately began to press, and Waterfield took the ball down to our goal, but shot over. Rigauds still continued to press, and gained a "corner" which resulted in nothing. Grants now wired up, and a run by Powell and Mills ended in a shot by the latter, which went behind. Rigauds then obtained a hands near our goal, but our backs cleared, and Barwell and Woodbridge took the ball down to Rigauds' territory, but Blaker stopped them. Rigauds got the ball down our end, and after a futile shot by Willett, hands was given for Rigauds in front of our goals, but Everington cleared, and our forwards got away, and Barwell put in a low shot, which Langton muddled, and Barwell rushed it through (1-0). After some give-and-take play, Waterfield scored for Rigauds (1-1). Nothing further occurred before half-time. On restarting our forwards got together, and Langton saved a good shot by Powell. Rigauds then got the ball, and Nye scored (1-2), but Woodbridge retaliated and equalized (2-2). Soon after the same player scored again from a centre by Barwell (3-2), and after some time Waterfield scored for Rigauds (3-3), and almost immediately Gates rushed the ball through again (4-3). Nothing further resulted. Rigauds were without the services of Shattock. For Grants the forwards were well together, and their shooting good; Scarfe was good in goals, and Everington and Campbell at back, showed great improvement; Fitzmaurice was the best of the half-backs. For Rigauds, Gifford, Waterfield, and Nye were best; Blaker at back playing a decidedly rough game.

GRANTS v. H.B.B. (TRIAL MATCH).

We tried hard to score, Winckworth and Barwell making several runs on the right, but failed. After some time Gregory scored by a hot shot (2-3). Pendred quickly followed with another (2-4). The play throughout was rather feeble, owing to the state of the ground.
