STAND AT EASE.

A COMMAND readily enough heard on Parade, but a phrase against which at the present time all precautions must be taken. As a nation there can be no 'stand at ease' for us—yet. Every fibre, every muscle must be strained towards one object—Victory, absolute and smashing, with a lasting Peace, on terms such as future generations of Englishmen shall never condemn as weak and unsatisfactory. The British Empire is at death-grips with the German Empire, and as members of the British Empire we back her and fight for her with every ounce of energy that is in us.

The institutions of the Empire come second only in importance to the Empire itself, and among institutions our School should hold for us the first place. We must back it through thick and thin, we must fight for it on the Cricket and the Footer field, we must work for it; we must learn its discipline (and discipline is not merely a matter of standing still on parade), we must uphold

and revel in its high traditions and associations. As a School we may never stand at ease, from the highest to the lowest (and the lowest must remember that they are as much representative of the School as the highest) there must be ceaseless, feverish activity on behalf of the School: those from below must come up well prepared to take the places of those that are leaving, and only if they begin to prepare at once can they hope to do so. Many of us seem to think that for a couple of terms after we arrive at the School we are entitled to stand at ease (whilst we find our feet, is the euphemistic explanation); but we may not; it impairs, as we see later on, not only our own efficiency but that of the School. But to efficiency in every department and not merely at the School the keynote is Discipline; Discipline hardly enforced by punishment upon unwilling martyrs, but a Discipline self-imposed and respected through a conviction that only thus can the School stand at unity and purpose.

PRO PATRIA.

Mr. Cecil, who was at the School from January 1903 to December 1907, was the eldest son of the Bishop of Exeter and grandson of the late Lord Salisbury. He went afterwards to Oxford, matriculating from University College. At the outbreak of the War he was in Canada and came back as a private in the Canadian Contingent. He fell gallantly, having volunteered for a dangerous task outside his normal work and seen it through to the end. It will be remembered that his next, brother has been twice wounded, and his youngest brother fell in the year 1915.

Major Charlton was the younger son of Mr. H. E. Charlton, Senior Assistant Controller of the Post Office Savings Bank. He was admitted as a K.S. in the year 1909 and became a Monitor and a distinguished member of the Cricket XI. He was elected to a Christ Church Exhibition, but the War prevented him from going into residence. He did

excellent work in the field and as adjutant of his battalion, and he won the Military Cross. All who knew him deplore the frustration of a promising career and of so many good qualities of head and heart.

Mr. Gordon, the younger son of Mr. W. E. Gordon of Chelsea, was admitted as a K.S. in the year 1911. Although of small stature, he was a vigorous athlete, beginning as a cricketer but later going to Water. On leaving School he obtained a commission in the Air Service, for which he was well fitted by his physique and by his taste for engineering. His elder brother, who was not a Westminster, fell before him.

Captain Gordon, the younger son of the Rev E. G. Gordon, vicar of St. John's, Lambeth, entered the School in September 1907, and left at Election 1913, going to Pembroke College, Cambridge, and afterwards taking a commission.

Mr. CRACKNELL, who was born Collins, and afterwards took his stepfather's name, was at the School from September 1902 to Easter 1906. He joined the Army for the War.

Mr. Liberty, the only son of the late J. I. Liberty, O.W., was at the School from September 1901 to July 1905. He afterwards followed the career of an actor, and joined the Army for the War.

School Notes.

At the first trial of Orations last Term P. R. Rea, J. S. Bentwich and K. McGregor were placed first out of an entry of 16. The passage set was the fine death-bed speech of John of Gaunt from 'Richard II.,' but none of the competitors gave a satisfying or pleasing rendering of it, and it is to be hoped that more trouble will be taken this Term.

R. F. Harrod and L. F. I. Bosanquet gained open scholarships at the end of last Term, the former in History at New College, Oxford, the latter in Science at Trinity, Cambridge. The Elizabethan offers its hearty, though belated, congratulations.

Bate, Dyson and Horton were given their Pinks during last Term. We play Charterhouse at Vincent Square on Saturday, March 9, an occasion on which every boy in the School should make arrangements to be present.

Capt. Hume continues his interesting lectures to the Commission Class, which was exceedingly sorry to hear him express the hope that he would not still be doing so next Term. An instructional Lewis gun has been lent, and Mr. Rudwick is giving instruction in its mechanism and use.

Professor Edmund Gardiner lectured up-School on Friday, Febuary 1, on Civilisation's Debt to Italy. He showed, among many others, some interesting lantern slides of the Italian Front.

Election is to be held this Term, in order to enable several candidates, who would otherwise have left, to compete. It is much to be regretted that the Election ceremonies have to be dispensed with.

Racquets Matches have been arranged this Term with Radley and Tonbridge, but their dates have not yet been definitely fixed.

THE SCIENTIFIC SOCIETY.

ON December 3 Mr. N. A. Garrard gave a lecture on 'Religions of the East.' He commenced with a short discussion on Shintoism, the polytheistic and ancestor worship of the East. He then proceeded to give an account of the life of Buddha, followed by the principles of the worship of Buddhism. He also mentioned the Indian religion of Brahmanism. The whole of his lecture was illustrated by means of lantern slides, and he also had a number of most interesting idols. On the whole his lecture was most instructive, and we have to thank Mr. Garrard for a lecture on a subject of which very little is known among Western nations.

On Tuesday, February 5, Mr. H. J. Salwey read a very instructive paper on 'Railway Signalling' to a large and appreciative audience. Starting with the origination of signalling from the simplest conventions, he went on to explain the methods now used on double-line railways. He then dealt with block signalling and the locking devices used for safety, illustrating his paper with diagrams. Continuing with the

methods used on single lines, he described the five chief devices: the staff, staff and ticket, electric staff, electric tablet, and the Sykes' interlocking systems, and then went on to automatic signalling. He next explained the relative advantages of power and hand signalling, concluding his excellent paper, which was well thought out, if read rather fast, with a few words on fog signalling.

THE MISSION.

To save expense, the report for the last year has only been issued to the School, the Committee, and the subscribers.

Unfortunately the two latter are not identical. The balance has been reduced from £75 to £57, and fresh subscribers are badly wanted. The Boys' Club and the Church Lads' Brigade have been well attended and are in a state of healthy activity, whilst E Company, 1st Cadet Battalion of 'The Queens,' numbers 100 strong.

Mr. Ellis has resigned the living of St. Mary's and has been succeeded by Mr. Laurence. Three of the former members of the Boys' Club have received commissions in the Army, and one has been honoured with the D.C.M.

Two legacies have been received from Old Rigaudites, and nearly all of the money has been invested in Exchequer Bonds, to be dealt with by the Committee after the War.
