THE PAST YEAR.

The past year has been in many ways an eventful one. The record of successes bears comparison with any of late years and there is little cause for complaint. We started our football season with 2 old "pinks" and 3 old housecolours and began well by beating Upper Elections (3-1), a thing which, we believe, Grants has not done for many years. In the Junior matches we were beaten by Ashburnham (2-0). In the final House Matches we played Ashburnham in the first round and won by 9-2, but in the final we succumbed to Rigauds (1-2). The Yard ties fell to Moon, Templer and Biggs. In the Shield Matches we again played Ashburnham in the first round and this time 6-2 in our favour was the verdict. Rigauds, who have probably never had a better team, had to forego the pleasure of meeting us, as influenza compelled us to scratch. The Yard ties were won by Moon, Heard and Pain. In the Sports, as in the last few years, we were not able to do as well as Grantite reputation demanded. In fact we only won three prizes. In the tug of war Rigauds, who were far the heavier team, pulled us over easily twice.

In Gymnasium competitions, too, we did not do as well as usual, though Templer won the handicap from scratch. In

the School racquet ties Moon met Whittow in the final, but did not play as well as in the former rounds as he suffered defeat by 2-o. In the School fives ties, Fox, who played with Whittow, did not survive the first round. Moon, too, who had Probyn as his partner, failed to enter the second round.

In Election Term the Junior Matches were won by us for the first time for many years. Our team played exceedingly well, and some of the younger members of the house promise well for the future, Both Ashburnham and H.BB. were beaten in an innings, as the scores in another column will show, and Templer and Taswell bowled very effectively, taking in all 21 wickets for 82, and 15 for 48 respectively. Against Ashburnham Templer played excellently for 55. In the Shield Matches H.BB. were beaten by 10 wickets. Moon and Fox hitting off the 84 runs required to win in the second innings in just over the three-quarters of an hour. Against Rigauds we made a poor show before the bowling of Probyn and More and were beaten by 79 runs. Our prospects for next year are fairly good. We shall have two "pinks" and four house-colours in football, and one "pink" and three house-colours in cricket. The younger members of Grants are distinctly promising, and we look to them to uphold the honour of Grants and to prove themselves no unworthy successors of those who have gone before.

HOUSE NOTES.

- D. W. Tacey left at the end of last term. There are no new boys.
- G. H. Viner contributed two songs, sung in his usual fine style, which deserve special mention amongst many good items. H. V. Anthony also, who left in 1891, rendered beautifully two pieces on the violin which greatly delighted the audience.
- A. R. Severn has been playing some fine innings at Oxford; notably a hard-hit 188 made in just under two hours.
- H. S. Ladell has also been scoring largely at the sister seat of learning. The Peripatetics C.C. has benefited by some of his efforts.

W. R. Moon was to have played for Middlesex v. Surrey at Lord's, but a former engagement kept him out of the field.

JUNIOR GRANTS v. JUNIOR ASHBURNHAM.

This match was played "Up Fields" and resulted in a victory of Grants by an innings and 42 runs. Ashburnham won the toss and sent in Lecky and Guy to face Taswell (pavilion end) and Templer. The first ball sent down by Templer bowled Lecky, and the fourth ball disposed of Guy (2 for 5). Taswell with the fifth ball of a maiden over bowled Barnett and from this point neither bowler met with any resistance till Beveridge made 12 and was run out. The innings closed for 32, Taswell taking 3 wickets for 6 runs and Templer 4 for 18, and no fewer than 3 being run out. Grants began with Day and Templer to the bowling of Lecky and Barnett. Day was bowled for 6 in Barnett's fourth over, the score standing at 24. Taswell joined Templer and the score was raised to 60, before the former was bowled by Beveridge for 25; Templer was eventually caught at the wicket for an excellent 55. No one else, with the exception of Barnes, offered much resistance and the innings terminated for 128. In their second innings Ashburnham did a little better, being dismissed for 52, of which Guy (11), Barnett (12), and Haweis (10), alone reached double figures. Templer got 7 for 19. The score and analysis are appended:—

Junior Grants v. Junior H.BB.

H.BB. won the toss and sent in Robinson and McCaskie. No one reached double figures with the exception of Jones, who took out his bat for 21, the innings realising 44. Grants began badly, the first wicket going down for no runs, but eventually the score reached 86, the tail playing up very pluckily. Of these Day made 14, Barnes 15, Bompas 14, and Aldwinckle 13. H.BB. could only reach 28 in their second innings, Jones again alone reaching double figures. In the match Templer took 10 wickets for 45 and Taswell 10 for 15. Day let 9 byes in both innings and in the second caught one and stumped one. Score and analysis:

TOWN BOY CHALLENGE SHIELD.

FIRST ROUND-GRANTS v. Home BOARDERS.

HOME BOARDERS won the toss, and, electing to bat, R. E. Murray and A. C. Robinson opened the innings. The start was sensational, Fox's 3rd and 4th balls proving fatal to Robinson and Jones (2 for o). McCaskie left at 5, but Corfield and Murray carried the score to 22, when the former was run out (4 for 22). Howarth and Anderson were soon got rid of, but Murray and Rayner, getting associated at 30, made an invaluable stand, adding 42 to the score, when Murray was unfortunately run out; he had played an extremely good innings of 32 for his side. Rayner left soon afterwards, having played a useful innings of 18 (8 for 78). F. J. A. Corfield and R. J. Murray then carried the score to 96, and the latter and Cunningham put on 29 for the last wicket. Murray carried his bat for a hard hit innings of 28, containing 5 fours. W. F. Fox and L. J. Moon started the Grantite innings, and runs came fast until Fox was got rid of for a good innings of 20 (1 for 34). Kirkpatrick followed, and, with Moon, added 40 to the score, when the former put his leg in front of a straight one, and retired for 15. Four later Moon also was caught, having played a capital innings of 38 (3 for 78). Of the rest no one else offered much resistance except Day, who went in second wicket, and carried his bat for a carefully played 21, out of 66 put on during his stay. The innings closed for 140, or 15 ahead of their opponents. R. E. Murray met with most success in the bowling, capturing 4 wickets for 28. In Home Boarders' second innings the first 2 wickets fell for 12, but R. E. Murray and Jones then carried the score to 54, at which total they both left, Murray for another good innings 28, and Jones for 12. After this T. H. Corfield with 10, and R. J. Murray with 14 alone reached double figures, and the innings eventually closed for 97, leaving Grants 83 to win. Moon and Fox immediately began to force the game, and in a short time put defeat out of the question. In one over of T. H. Corfield's 18 runs were scored, and the first two overs of P. T. Jones's realised 22 runs. The 83 required to win were hit off without the loss of a wicket, Moon having made 43, and Fox 39, both by excellent cricket. Grants thus won by 10 wickets.

FINAL

GRANTS v. RIGAUDS.

AFTER holding the shield for three years, Grants were deprived of it in this match by Rigauds, who won, as expected, by 79 runs. Rigauds won the toss, and went in first. Probyn and Blaker were got rid of when the score was only 6, but Beasley and More put on 62 runs while together, when More was caught for a good innings of 32. Four later Beasley left for a capital 29. Of the rest Whittow alone made any stand, and he was eventually caught in the deep field for a hard-hit 33 out of 55 put on during his stay. Kirkpatrick bowled very well, capturing 5 wickets for 21. Of the innings of Grants there is little to say, no one being able to make any stand against the bowling of Probyn and More, and they were all out for a paltry 19. Probyn took 7 wickets for 6, and More 3 for 4. Rigauds then went in in a bad light and were quite unable to cope with Kirkpatrick's bowling, who took 7 wickets for 13. In their second innings Grants made a slightly better show, Mr. Extras being again top scorer, and of the rest Moon alone reaching double figures.
