## ARCHIDIDASCALI WESTMONASTERIENSES.

No. 12.—WILLIAM VINCENT.

(Continued.)

It is time to give some account of his literary productions. In 1787 he published a small tract entitled "Considerations on Parochial Music" and in 1793 he won for himself an European reputation as a scholar by the publication of another small tract—"De Legione Maniliana Quaestio ex Livio disumpta, et Rei militius Romanae studiosis proposita." His object in this essay was to reconcile Polybius' account of the Roman Legion with a passage in the 8th book of Livy. The excellence of this essay has been amply testified to by the approbation which it received from such men as Professor Porson and Professor Keyne. In the two following years

Vincent published two essays on the Greek Verb and in 1797 he published the first part of that work for which his name will ever be remembered: "A commentary on Anian's Voyage of researches from the Indus to the Euphrates.' The success which this important work met induced him to publish in 1800, the "Periplus of the Erythraean Sea." This appeared in two parts, the first of which was dedicated to the King, the second to Lord Sidmouth.

In 1807 these three works were republished with considerable addition and corrections, making two quarto volumes, under the title of "The Commerce and Navigation of the Ancients in the Indian Ocean." A few of his sermons were published during his life and after his death his son, Rev. W. Vincent, collected sufficient to make up a volume, and to this Lieutenant-General Thornton added a second set. Besides the writings above-mentioned, Dr. Vincent made very many valuable contributions to magazines, among which may be enumerated the Classical Journal, the Gentleman's Magazine etc. An account of his life and writings, written by Dr. Noris, appears in the 13th and 14th vols. of the Classical Journal.

Cowper testifies unconsciously to the excellences of Vincent's power of versification. A copy of verses written by the Dean fell into Cowper's hand. These the poet translated into English without knowing their author, and printing them in a collection of his poems he added the following foot-note: "I make no apology for the introduction of the following lines, though I have never learned who wrote them. Their elegance will sufficiently recommend them to persons of classical taste and erudition and I shall be happy if the English version that they have received from me be found not to dishonour them." Dr. Vincent died in December, 1815, at the Deanery and was buried in S. Benedict's Chapel in the Abbey Church. The simple inscription on his monument was

his own composition and is on that account all the more interesting.

### THE PAST FOOTBALL SEASON.

Though Grants have not succeeded in winning the shield, yet they have played throughout the season with great energy and pluck. We began well by defeating Junior Rigauds by two goals to nil. Next we played Upper Elections and defeated them by 2 goals to 1. Against Junior H.BB. we drew (1-1). In the trial matches we were not quite so successful. We were defeated by Rigauds by 4 goals to 3, after a very good match. We were again defeated by H.BB. by 4 goals to 3. This match was an uninteresting one, as the ground was very hard and slippery, so that the play was rather feeble. On March 12th we played Rigauds and were unfortunately defeated after a most exciting match by 3 goals to 2. It is only fair to say that the victory of Rigauds resulted chiefly from the absence of Barwell. As it was, the conbination on our right wing was spoilt. We believe that in the natural course of events seven\* of this year's team will be available next year.

The record of the past season reads:—Matches played 6, won 2, drawn 1, lost 3, goals for 13, against 13.

#### THE SPORTS.

Grants have been much more successful in the sports this year than last. E. W. Woodbridge won the Hurdles and the Long Jump, was second in throwing the Hammer, and third in the 300 yards over 16 and the Open 100.

J. Corbett won the mile and W. T. Barwell came in third C. N. Lambton was first in the 300 yards over 16, and second in the Open Quarter. H. D. Everington was first in the 100 under 16 and the Quarter under 16, second in the Long Jump (Open), and third in the Hurdles (Open). C. Stanhope-Jones was third in the Quarter under 16, G. N. Scarfe got in third in the Consolation Race.

Grants have therefore won 6 first prizes, 3 second prizes and 6 third prizes. We obtained more prizes than College or H.BB. but not so many as Rigauds. We do not understand why the wearing of colours this year was made optional. If everyone wore colours it would give a much better effect.

# JUNIOR GRANTS v. JUNIOR H.BB.

This match, commenced on Monday, May 12th, and ended Monday, May 19th, was won by Junior H.BB.

Maclean won the toss but decided not to bat first. H.BB. therefore went in, but with the exception of Agar and Page made a poor show. Grants on going in scored still less. The last six players did not put on a single run. The runs were mostly made by Scarfe and Burton, and Maclean played steadily for his 9. H.BB. on going in again made a great improvement on their last innings, the total score of their second innings being 203, while in their first innings they only got 78. Agar and Batchelor played very well, the former getting 40 runs, the latter 53. A. W. Guy, Morcom and Fevez also knocked our bowling about a good deal. Grants in their second innings obtained 100 runs. Maclean played well and steadily for 27. Gatty and Woodbridge added 31 runs at the end.
