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## THE PAST CRICKET SEASON.

BUT for a single match there is little joy in a retrospect of the year's cricket. Of the thirteen matches but one went in our favour, and no less than eleven were lost. Nor is there much to be alleged in extenuation. The unhappy fact is that the team numbered no cricketer of the first rank, and usually failed in the spirit by which difficulties are overcome. Two or three batsmen and one or two bowlers occasionally showed some promise, but except in the case of Blane the promise found little fulfilment. In these circumstances our readers will expect but a brief survey of the year's work.

In the first match, which was against a fairly strong but very unequal team, the respectable

score of 161 gave hopes of some batting skill. Blane played good cricket, Harrison made a total which he was not destined to equal, and Roberts showed that he could hit. In the second match, which was with Harrow Blues, our bowling was knocked all to pieces, and our batsmen made a mournful procession. The match with Incogniti provided the only draw of the season. In the West Kent match a victory seemed at one time certain, but Willett and Powers, playing as substitutes, proved too much for our bowlers. In the match with the Eton Ramblers Blane first showed himself in his true colours, but the bowlers were again ineffective. For Kensington Park J. G. Donaldson again scored heavily against us after a collapse in our six last wickets. The next two matches were equally unhappy, and our first innings against Charterhouse gave no promise of better things.



Our recovery and ultimate victory on this occasion were all the more creditable to the team as a whole that Blane scored little in either innings. In the next match he made amends. The match against O. W.W. was chiefly remarkable for the stand made by our opponents on the last wicket. Of the last two matches of the season there is little favourable to say.

Not only does Blane stand at the top of the batting averages, but he was undoubtedly the best cricketer in the team. That with no higher score than 67 he had an average of 25 shows how consistent his batting was. His hitting on the leg side was especially good, and he made a useful change bowler. As a bat Cleveland-Stevens lacked spirit and defence. That he could bat well on occasion he showed in the Charterhouse match. In bowling he showed great improvement on last year. Harrison looked more like a bat than many members of the team, but his defence had many weak points. The surprise of the eleven was found in Page, who was not chosen for the first match, but in the end had the second place in the batting averages. When he got over his initial nervousness he showed himself a stalwart and courageous bat. Greene showed some style, but never made many runs, and his bowling was a disappointment. Roberts can hit for a time, but neither his batting nor his bowling lasts. Of the two Logans, the elder has an unusual style, but a certain doggedness stood him in good stead, while his brother has distinct promise and is yet young enough to make it good; at present he is too eager to hit. Knight has lost his batting and was not successful with the ball. A useful slow bowler was found in Law, and could he have increased his pace a little he might have been of very great service.

The fielding of the team was most uneven. Brilliant catches were made and easy catches were dropped. The smart fielding in the second innings of Charterhouse was in pleasant contrast with what was sometimes seen late in an afternoon.

In the House matches Rigaud's were at one

time in danger from H. BB., but were saved by Page and Willett. For H. BB. Vernon played a bold innings. In the final Rigaud's found themselves no match for Grant's. Against T. BB. a single run on the first innings gave the victory to K.S.S.

For next year we must express the hope that Knight may captain a more successful team. Harrison, Greene, and Logan may be expected to prove useful, while of the rest Crowe and Willett are not without style, and Colt-Williams has shown that he can hit.

The ground remains in good condition and the wickets were generally satisfactory. During the holidays the pavilion has been largely repaired.

### CRICKET.

#### WESTMINSTER v. ESSEX CLUB AND GROUND.

PLAYED Saturday, July 13. Our opponents brought down, as usual, a strong team containing some good "pro." bowlers. They won the toss, and Fane and Barlow faced Roberts and Blane. The former in his second over got Barlow l.b.w., and in his third Fane played on somewhat unluckily, but the ball came back a lot. Sewell and Russell made a good stand, and added 68 by clean and hard batting. Borradaile stayed some time and made many singles; but it was Greene and Leigh-Ibbs who destroyed our hopes of getting rid of the team for 200 runs. Both were very lucky at the commencement of their innings, being badly missed more than once, and though often making good hits were lucky that they did not come nearer the fieldsmen. The innings was declared when Greene reached his 100, 354 for 9 wickets.

Cleveland-Stevens and Blane opened our innings, but neither stayed long; in fact, the venture only realised 77, the batsmen making little headway against

Tremlin and Sewell. Greene batted carefully and pluckily, and made top-score. Harrison was unlucky in being brilliantly caught and bowled by Tremlin, one-handed high up, the bowler having to leap into the air. Of the rest, only H. Logan made any resistance, and we were soon all out for the poor total of 77, leaving us beaten by 277 runs and 1 wicket.

S. A. Dickson took the place of C. M. Page, who was absent through examinations.

#### WESTMINSTER v. OLD CARTHUSIANS.

Played Saturday, July 20. For this match Page returned to the team. So far the School had only succeeded in winning one match, v. Charterhouse, and for some time it seemed quite probable that its second and last win might be over the Old Carthusians. But some fine batting by Wallace, Timmis, and Peers redeemed a poor start, and made the respectable score for the visitors of 269 for 7



wickets. Timmis got his runs chiefly by clean, hard drives, but it was a finely-played innings. There was some dispute as to how Wilkinson was out, Elson saying he was caught at the wicket, and Sames that he was bowled. It was eventually decided that he hit his wicket. Cleveland-Stevens got all the seven wickets, and, though at times freely hit, bowled well. The School made a good start, for after Cleveland-Stevens left at 21, Blane and Greene by careful and excellent cricket took the score to 72. From this point, however, a collapse occurred, 3 wickets at one time falling at the same total (89). Harrison laid about him well, and Roberts reached double figures, but we were all out for 143, thus being beaten by 162 runs and 3 wickets. C. Wreford-Brown did the damage, taking 6 wickets for 53 runs.

Going in fourth wicket, he was last out for an excellent 35. Baker brought off a brilliant 'caught and bowled,' and divided the bowling honours with Law.

K.SS. started with Harrison and Roberts to the bowling of Blane and Greene, but with 1 on the board Roberts was bowled. However, Crowe came in and hit up a useful 19, so that the second wicket fell for 39. Baker, Walters, and Gardner all played well, Ford making the winning hit, so that K.SS. won by 1 run.

T.BB. in their second innings made 96 for 3 wickets, Dickson (41), Page (28), and H. Logan (12), being chief contributors. K.SS. put together 74 in their second venture. Time, however, did not permit the second innings to be finished, so the match was decided by the first innings.

## DEBATING SOCIETY.

At an Extraordinary Meeting held on Thursday, September 26, the following were elected officers of the Society for the ensuing Session :—

The House met again on Thursday, October 3, and discussed the following motion: 'That this House disapproves of the method of supplying the deficit in the Budget by raising the Income Tax.'

The motion furnished a very poor debate, chiefly owing to the lamentable ignorance of facts displayed by several members.

The PROPOSER (C. B. H. Knight) began by suggesting the following amendment in the wording of the motion, which was carried *nem. con.*, viz.: 'That this House disapproves of the method of supplying the deficit in the present Budget.' Continuing, the Proposer objected to the taxation of necessities such as coal and sugar. He thought that luxuries, such as wines, spirits, and tobacco, should be heavily taxed. He went on to say—quoting Mr. Chamberlain as his authority—that a war tax should be levied on the colonies, who had shown themselves so loyal in furnishing large numbers of men. He thought that the colonies, in return for the protection extended to them and the safeguarding of their interests by Great Britain, ought at least to be prepared to make some pecuniary sacrifices. He ended by suggesting as a new tax that all trades and professions should require a licence.

The OPPOSER (W. T. S. Sonnenschein) thought that business men ought not to be taxed but rather encouraged; in fact he was in favour of remission of taxation in their cases. He contended that the bulk of the taxes should fall on the middle classes. The colliery owners ought to be prepared to give up some of their large profits for the benefit of the State in emergencies. He thought bicycling was now not so much a pastime as a means for doing one's work, so that a bicycle tax would not produce any large sum. He ended by expressing himself in favour of indirect taxation, on the ground that it produced more than a direct system.

K. N. COLVILLE, who seconded, in a maiden speech said that he thought the Opposer's remarks had been inconsistent. A graduated system of taxation was, he thought, more unfair on the family man who is doing his duty to the State than to the bachelor who is not. He emphatically denied the Opposer's statement that bicycling as a pastime had now quite gone out of fashion. The bulk of the taxes ought to be paid not by the middle class working men, but by the rich who do nothing for their money.

The PRESIDENT thought that incomes of £1,000 and upwards should pay one-third more taxes than

those below, and so on. He was in favour of a tax on commercial incomes and also on public advertisements. The latter method, he said, was employed in France and Switzerland, where he believed that it produced a considerable sum. He further pointed out that the tax on coal was borne almost if not entirely by the foreign consumer.

The PROPOSER preferred temporary taxes for the present emergency, to be paid equally by all. He strongly objected to the taxation of sugar on the ground that it was a necessity and not a luxury.

Mr. J. B. WHITMORE (honorary member) criticised the Proposer's suggestion that a war tax should be levied on the colonies. He thought that we ought to be very thankful to them for supplying us with men, as we had not consulted them as to the war.

After further remarks by the PRESIDENT, OPPOSER, Mr. ADAMS, and Mr. BROWNING (honorary members) the House divided, when there voted for the motion in its amended form 7 members, and 12 members against it. The motion was therefore lost by a majority of 5 votes.

WE record with much regret the death of FREDERICK HALE FORSHALL, author of 'Westminster School, Past and Present.' He was born in 1829, became Q.S. in 1844, and was elected to Cambridge in 1848. In 1849 he migrated to New South Wales, and was for some time Librarian of the University of Sydney. He returned to England in 1855, and published his book in 1884.
