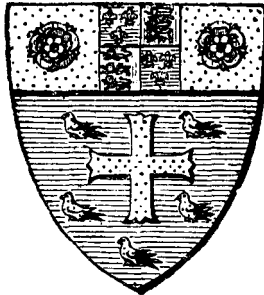

GRANTS AND GRANTITES.

It seems a fitting time at this period of the year, with the cricket season to look back upon, and the football season practically, as regards house matches, to look forward to, to discuss the present position and future prospects of the House ; a theme which should be ever dear to both past and present Grantites. GRANTS v. THIRD ELECTIONS.

This match was played "Up Fields" in dull weather on Friday, October 14th. Grants won the toss and electing to play with the wind, More kicked off for the Q.SS. from the Hospital End at 2 p.m. Play was mostly confined to the Q.S. goal and after about ten minutes' play the ball was rushed through by Ladell (1—0). This was quickly followed up by a pretty dribble by A. R. Severn and a low shot which beat Clapham (2—0). Just before half-time Severn scored again by a similar shot, the sides crossing over with the score (3—0) in favour of Grants. In the second half, from a good centre by Scott, Hutchinson added a 4th goal for Grants, who left the field victorious by 4 goals to nil.

For Grants, A. R. Severn, L. J. Moon and A. Severn, who saved one specially good shot, were best. For Third Elections J. F. More, E. P. Garrett and E. H. Waterfield were the pick.

JUNIOR GRANTS *v.* JUNIOR ASHBURNHAM HOUSE.

This match was played "Up Fields" on Monday, October 23rd, and produced a very even game, though Grants should have won easily. Grants won the toss and played with the wind for the first half, each side in turn having to act on the defensive. Nothing was scored, however, though Campbell got away once or twice, but shot wide. Like Severn he was placed at a great disadvantage having nobody to combine with. In the second half Woodbridge scored for Grants with a good shot, but in the last ten minutes Fox unfortunately headed the ball through Grants' goal from a corner, thus making the score equal. Grants failing to gain the winning point, the game ended in a draw of one goal each. For Grants Severn, considering he was strictly marked throughout the game, played well. L. J. Moon, at full back, played a grand game, getting through an immense amount of work. Campbell was best for Ashburnham.

Grants' team was the same as *v.* Third Elections, except Lesley played vice Tacey and Woodbridge for Ladell.

JUNIOR GRANTS *v.* JUNIOR ASHBURNHAM.

Replayed on Monday, October 31st. A. R. Severn scored the only goal of the match shortly before half-time, Grants

thus winning (1—0). Campbell did not assist Ashburnham, owing to his having played for the School on the previous Saturday. Robertson was allowed to play in his place.

The teams were the same as in the first match except for Ashburnham Kirkpatrick and Colvin played instead of Colville and Campbell.

JUNIOR GRANTS *v.* JUNIOR H.BB.

This match, the final of the Junior House matches, was played on Tuesday, November 1st. The turf was in better condition than on the day before, and a good game resulted. Grants lost the toss—the first time this season—and kicked off from the Church end shortly after 2 p.m. The game was very evenly contested, Wilson being prominent for H.BB. on the outside right. When the game had been in progress for about fifteen minutes, Miller came down the left and shot, beating the Grantite goal-keeper, and notching the first point for Home Boarders. Nothing else was scored up to half-time, the sides crossing over with H.BB. leading (1—0). The play continued very fast, both custodians having to use their hands, but at last Lesley shot, and Rigby caught the ball high up, but it having passed through the uprights, was given a goal. Both sides then strove hard to gain the winning point, and Carr running down shot, and A. Severn failing to clear, Guy shot again and scored (2—1). There only remained, a few minutes more time and as nothing further resulted H.BB. left the field, victors by the narrow margin of 2 goals to 1.

For Grants A. R. Severn and G. Hutchinson were good. Moon played his usual vigorous game and Scott did some good work.

For H.BB. Howlett, Wilson and Guy did most.
