CAMP.

MANY people get their ideas of camp from what they have seen of a few tents on a hillside, inhabited by enthusiastic seekers for a simple life. They look inside the tents and see a confused mass of bedding, clothing, plates, and knives, while outside they find a dirty little oil-stove being used for cooking meals. It is then no use talking of the delightful freedom of an outdoor life; they are willing to grant you the freedom, but are unwilling to give up an ordered life, a clean home, and regular well-cooked meals. They prefer that things should be done decently and in order, and they object to the mess of so-called camp life. It might be very good fun for a few days, but when the novelty had worn off how tiring it would be.

All such people ought to see an Officers' Training Corps camp. There they would see order instead of mess, cleanliness instead of dirt; and there they would realise that the joys of the open air can be had without giving up the most important items of a civilised life.

The sight of such a great camp would stir even the most stony-hearted among us. The imposing spectacle of four thousand boys on parade, the thought that their camp is guarded at night by the boys themselves, the sight of the big battalions moving away across the country for field-work, the delight of seeing large bodies of regular troops of all arms—these things appeal very strongly to the imagination of a healthy British schoolboy.

In camp he experiences the joy of getting up really early in the morning, when everything

is fresh and bright, the pleasure of doing things for himself and a delightful freedom from the noise and rush of towns. He looks round the camp and realises how much can be done by discipline, how important are order and method in corporate life, how essential is cleanliness in the life of a gentleman. He has not to think when he gets up in the morning: "How shall I drag myself through this day?"—that is all arranged for him. He knows that he will have plenty of exercise and plenty of healthy work. The evening come, the day's work over, how he enjoys the row on the canal, the bathe in the reservoir, the games of cricket and football, the mild "rag." Is he happy? Go to the "sing-song" and see. Nowhere could you find a happier collection of boys. Does he enjoy the life? Watch him when he is listening to the band in the evening; hear what he has to say when he is going to bed.

But camp does more than provide pleasure and amusement for a boy. He goes to camp thinking "what a curious fellow So-and-So is"; there he learns what good qualities he possesses and what a fine fellow he really is. How seldom does a boy refuse to go to camp for a second time? A few there are, who will never take kindly to rising at any hour before eight and who will not wash plates for themselves. But the general verdict is that it is the jolliest time in the year, and the general desire is "to come again next year."

We have devoted ourselves so far to recording the personal pleasures which a boy experiences in camp. But the week's training also teaches him much about military affairs. This is usually his only opportunity of seeing large bodies of troops in the field. The quality of the military work in camp has often been praised by regular officers; for the cadets are keen and energetic, and make up in zeal for the ignorance of their officers.

Anyone who has seen the difference produced in a company by the week's training will appreciate the value, both physical and military, of camp life.

WESTMINSTER SCHOOL v. I ZINGARI.

THIS match was played at Vincent Square on Saturday 20 May, and ended in a severe defeat for the School. Rawson won the toss and decided to bat on a nice easy wicket. Murray and Mellor opened our innings to the bowling of Hesketh Pritchard and Mann. Before a single run had been scored Mann bowled Mellor with a ball which swung in from the off, and five runs later Rudd was dismissed by a similar ball from Pritchard. When Rawson joined Murray things seemed a little better but the third wicket fell at 15, and the fourth at 24. Slubicki made one or two useful shots and Gilmour tried to remedy matters by some vigorous hitting, but the School were all out by lunch for 57, the extras being the only double figure score. The visitors went in after lunch and immediately began to hit the bowling about, Studd especially driving with refreshing vigour. Buchanan fell finally to a nice catch by Rawson for a well-played 31. Wright added 82 to the score in about as many minutes before being well stumped by Potter. Hunt also played well, scoring all round the wicket for his 46, but Mann got in front of a straight one from Cobbold when he had only made 3. The first twenty minutes' play was not productive of very bright cricket and Rawson was the first to fall to a nice catch by Kann off Cobbold. Master now joined Fleuret and played carefully for some time until he was joined by Bompas. Matters then became more lively and Cozens, who had gone on for Rawson, was hit a good deal. Murray finally effected their separation, bowling Bompas for a clever 23. The next 7 wickets fell quickly for the addition of only 43 runs, Cobbold being finally credited with 4 wickets for 37, and Cozens 4 for 25.

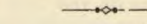

PUBLIC SCHOOLS ATHLETIC CLUB.

To the Editor of "The Elizabethan."

DEAR SIR,—It will probably be of interest to your Readers to know that the scheme for establishing a Public Schools Athletic and Residential Club in the neighbourhood of London is now matured, and that within a short time a formal Prospectus will be issued, and be posted to some 40,000 Old Public School Boys, whose addresses have been forwarded to me by the Honorary Secretaries of their respective Associations.

About 120 Schools are on the Club list, but it will be proposed for men who were not members of one of these Schools to become members of the Club if they are proposed and seconded by Public School Men.

Outlined very briefly, the scheme provides for the erection of numerous Fives and Squash Courts, Hard Tennis Courts, Tennis and Croquet Lawns, a Gymnasium, a Swimming Bath, a first-class Football Ground, a Running Track, a Bowling Alley, a Miniature Rifle Range, and a large Club House comprising a number of bed-rooms, billiard room, dining-room, smoking-room, changing room and baths, and many other conveniences. Additional buildings will be put up as soon as possible.

The initial cost will be about £18,000, and a limited Company with a Capital of £20,000 is now in course of formation.

The annual subscriptions for Town Members will be £2, £3, £4, £4 10s. or £5, according to the number of shares taken by a Member; those taking one share only will pay the last-named subscription. Country Members will pay £1 less than Town Members, and special arrangements will be made for Foreign Members. Two hundred Ladies will be admitted to membership of the Club at an annual subscription of £2.

There will be no entrance fee for those applying for membership within a certain period after the issue of the Prospectus. The charge for the use of Courts (if any charge is made) will be very small.

These subscriptions are very low compared with those of the existing Clubs, such as Queen's Club, Prince's Club, Lord's, &c., while the facilities provided by the Club will be open to all Public School and University Men, instead of being only accessible to the few.

It is hoped to be able to open the new Club in January next with a Membership of from 2,500 to 3,000. A most excellent site at Wembley Park, adjoining the Metropolitan Railway Station, has been fixed upon; it adjoins also a splendid Golf Course, and is served by about 140 trains a day in each direction from and to Baker Street, the journey taking about twelve minutes by a non-stop train.

The first Directors of the Club will be Messrs. Eustace H. Miles (Marlborough), *Chairman*, J. W. H. T. Douglas (Felsted), A. C. Ainger (Eton), E. V. Speller (Clifton), and two other well-known men, one of whom will be an old Harrow Boy; and, amongst those who have already accepted seats on the Advisory Committee are Messrs. C. H. Eyre (Harrow), E. Crawshay-Williams, M.P. (Eton), S. S. Harris (Westminster), J. S. Morgan (Berkhamsted),

M. Morgan-Owen (Shrewsbury), A. Vassall (Charterhouse), H. Vassall (Marlborough), and some twenty other representatives of the leading Schools.

Nearly all the leading Headmasters, including those of Eton, Harrow, Repton, Marlborough, Clifton, Uppingham, Rugby, Haileybury, Tonbridge, Cheltenham, Wellington, Mill Hill, Rossall, Sherborne, Merchant Taylors, Merchiston, Loretto, Glenalmond, Edinburgh Academy, Dulwich, Forest, Radley, Felsted, Dean Close, Aldenham, Whitgift, City of London, and many others have given their approval to the scheme, and some of them have contributed towards the preliminary expenses.

Any of your readers who will send me a Postcard stating their School or University will be sure of receiving a Prospectus as soon as they are printed; but, owing to the great amount of work on my hands, I fear that I shall be unable for the present to reply to correspondence.
