

VALE.

It is with mixed feelings, we suppose, that the House looks forward to the last day of this term. To the new boy, it is a great day. With the term behind him he can forget work, and sally forth to enjoy a full eight weeks of holiday. But to those who are leaving it is a sad day. But for the War, we should, many of us, meet again at the Varsity, but now Leave never seems to coincide. The wrench at parting is to many a great one, and it is extraordinary how great, sometimes all unbeknown, is one's affection for the School.

There are fourteen fellows leaving this term, the largest number known to leave in one term. With several new boys to take their places, this will mean that the House next term will be virtually a new one. But, young as the House will be, we feel sure that it will rise to its responsibilities, and carry on, with undiminished zeal, the great traditions of "Grant's."

INFLUENZA.

The most outstanding feature of this term has been the extraordinary epidemic of "Flu." which broke out about the third week in June, and completely paralysed all our activities at the busiest period of the term. At first we congratulated ourselves on our immunity from the disease, but our fancied security was short-lived, for in a day or two our numbers decreased from 55 to 26, including, in its toils, four of the monitors, and a large percentage of Chiswickites, and those who least expected it found greatness thrust upon them. It could not have come at a more unfortunate moment, for in that week we had intended to play the Final of Seniors, hold the Inspection, and also to play Charterhouse, in order that these events might be finished off before the Harvest Camp, which began on July 1st. As eight of the XI. were out of School, the Charterhouse match had to be scratched, and the Inspection held with depleted numbers. Seniors, however, were postponed until the last week of the term. In other ways, too, the "Flu." made itself felt, for we had to scratch our entry for the Inter-House Rowing, and Wooden and Yard Ties also suffered.

THE WAR.

Among the Birthday Honours we were glad to see the names of several Old Grantites whose war services have thus been recognised. Col. Sir Wm. B. Leishman, C.B., F.R.S., who is one of the most distinguished members of the Army Medical Services has been awarded a K.C.M.G. Capt. C. G. Reed, Lieut. K. G. Sillar and Lieut. E. L. Hodgson have been awarded the Military Cross, while the following Old Grantites have been mentioned in Despatches:—Lieut. I. W. A. Geare, Yeomanry (Staff), Major S. D. Graham, M.C., R.F.A., Lieut. E. L. Hodgson, R.F.A., Lieut.-Col. A. Martin-Leake, V.C., F.R.C.S., R.A.M.C., and Col. Sir William Leishman, K.C.M.G., C.B.

There are now about 276 Grantites serving in H.M.'s Forces, of whom 39 have given their lives for their country.

PRO PATRIA.

We have to record with deep regret that six more Old Grantites have given their lives for their country :—Lieut.-Col. Lambert Alfred Graham Hanmer, D.S.O., Indian Cavalry, Captain Norman Mortimer Joseph Kohnstamm, the Manchester Regiment, Captain John Herbert Williams, Lieut. Cecil Martin Sankey, M.C., The Buffs, attached R.A.F., Lieut. Arthur Charles Lionel Abrahams, Coldstream Guards, and 2nd Lieut. Leslie Grantham Heigham-Plumtre.

Col. Hanmer was the son of Admiral Hanmer, and a descendant of Sir Thomas Hanmer (O.W.), Speaker of the House of Commons under George I. He was up Grant's from 1882-1885. He died of wounds received in Mesopotamia, April 29th, 1918.

Capt. Kohnstamm was the eldest of three Grantites, sons of Mr. R. Kohnstamm, of whom two have now given their lives for their country. He was Head of Grant's 1914-15. He was killed in action in April, 1918. We deeply sympathise with his family in their double loss.

Capt. Williams was up Grant's from 1869 to 1872, when he was elected into College. He was a Barrister and went out to France as a Court Marshal Officer. He died while on service.

Lieut. C. M. Sankey was the only son of Major Sankey, and was up Grant's 1911-1914. He first served in Queen Victoria's Rifles, and was then nominated for Sandhurst, and given a commission in the Buffs. He was awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous gallantry at the Battle of Loos. Exchanging into the R.A.F., he was accidentally killed while flying on May 15th, 1918.

Lieut. A. C. L. Abrahams was the only son of Sir Lionel Abrahams, K.C.B., and was up Grant's as a non-resident K.S. 1911-16. He was in the Coldstream Guards, and after being reported as missing he is now officially reported as killed on April 13th, 1918.

2nd Lieut. L. G. Heigham-Plumtre was the adopted son of Mrs. Heigham, and was up Ashburnham and then up Grant's (1907-13). He died on June 4th of injuries accidentally received on June 2nd.

O.T.C.

There were two promotions this term :—H. J. Salwey to be C.S.M. (acting C.Q.M.S.) and E. W. St. G. Spencer to be Corporal.

Brig.-Gen. Lord Henry Seymour, D.S.O. (G.G.), inspected the Corps on Friday, June 28th, and complimented the Company on its steadiness and marching. We were unfortunate in having no less than 60 Cadets absent owing to the influenza, prevalent just then.

Camp this year will be held at Tidworth Park, from July 23rd—August 1st. 120 Cadets will attend, of which 24 are Grantites. There is also a Harvest Camp at Brede, near Hastings. This Camp starts on July 1st and continues until the end of September. The work will be done by three parties, one for each month.

SHOOTING.

After a lapse of six long years, the Shooting Cup has once more come "home."

Despite a heated controversy with Ashburnham, we succeeded in beating them by the narrow margin of only two points. We had the very bad luck to lose A. L. Vanneck, the best shot in the VIII., less than a week before the match. Also the IV. were all laid low with influenza, and had only just recovered when the Competition was held.

T. H. N. Ballantyne has quite recovered his lost form this season, and has shot consistently well for the VIII. E. W. St. G. Spencer, although handicapped by short-sight, shot very creditably, while H. J. Salwey, despite his arduous duties which prevented his practising, saved the side from defeat.

ATHLETIC SPORTS.

Grant's again won the cup, for the second year in succession. Space prevented us from printing more than a brief note of the result in our last number. As only three members of the House, all of whom will have left by next year, contributed points, our outlook is not very promising.

On the first day Salwey won the half mile with hurdles, and Spencer took second place in the Hammer.

The second day was full of excitement. We carried off both places in the 100 yards, and first place in both the High Jump and the Quarter. However, our position was by no means secure, and excitement ran high when it was seen that Grant's and Colledge each had 29 points to their credit with the mile still to be run. In this race, it was seen that the result would lie between Harrod (A.H.H.), Binney and Crane (K.S.S.), and Salwey (G.G.), of whom Binney had led throughout, but in the last lap Salwey gradually drew ahead, and the final order was Salwey, Binney, Crane; Grant's thus winning the cup by one point.

Probably the best individual performances for the House were Salwey's Quarter (56 one-fifth secs.), and Spencer's High Jump (5 ft. 4½ ins.).

The points gained by Grant's were made up as follows :—

H. J. Salwey, 18 points, winning the ¼ mile, ½ mile with hurdles, the mile, ½ mile handicap, 300 yards handicap, and second in the 100 yards.

N. A. Mackintosh, 8 points, winning the 100 yards, and second in the Long Jump.

E. W. St. G. Spencer, 8 points, winning the High Jump, and second in the Hammer.

An Athletic Cup has been presented to the School to be held annually by the most successful competitor in the sports. We heartily congratulate H. J. Salwey upon being the first recipient of this honour.

SENIORS.

GRANT'S *v.* RIGAUD'S.

After a very exciting finish, the match ended in a victory for us by 16 runs. Grant's won the toss and went in first, Kohnstamm and Buckley opening the innings. Only 10, how-

ever, had been scored when Buckley was bowled by Berryman. With the score at 29 for 2, Salwey joined Ballantyne, and for a short time runs came freely. It is a noticeable fact that in both innings byes were top score, and if Rigaud's had not had a long stop in the second half of our second innings we should have won much more easily. With 76 on the board, and Ballantyne and Salwey both out, Grant's fared disastrously, only Peacock showing any form at all, and the innings closed with a total of 94.

Berryman (36) and Pickering (28) were top scorers for Rigaud's, and both played well, but the remainder of the side played a slow game. The Grantite fielding was keen, but not brilliant, Rigaud's making many more than they should have done.

In the second innings we made an excellent start, and 61 was on the board before Kohnstamm was given out l.b.w. Only 15 more had been added when Salwey was out to a doubtful catch at the wicket. Runs continued to come quickly, and Buckley and Peacock hitting out splendidly, put on another 50 runs, bringing the score up to 140 for 4. After this the side collapsed, and we were all out with the addition of only 20 runs.

Although only four of the Rigaudite team succeeded in reaching double figures, yet considerable difficulty was experienced in dismissing the last two men, no less than six maiden overs being bowled. The chief bowling honours go to Main and Swann.

DEATHS.

We regret to have to record the death of Robert Leigh Pemberton, who was entered up Grant's as a boarder in 1865. The eldest son of the late Edward Leigh Pemberton, K.C.B., M.P., of Torrey Hill, he subsequently held a commission in the Grenadier Guards. He succeeded to the family place on the death of his father, and died there on April 14th, aged 66.

OLD GRANTITES.

The Rt. Honble. Sir Walter G. F. Phillimore, Bart., D.L. (Grant's, 1857-Q.S. 1859), has been raised to the Peerage in recognition of his distinguished services as a Lord Justice.

Lt.-Col. Sir Theodore Morison, K.C.S.I., K.C.I.E. (Grant's, 1878-82), who resigned his post on the India Council to join the Army has recently returned from East Africa, where he has been employed for the last two years in military, political and administrative duties.

Mr. C. H. Bompas, I.C.S. (1880-1886), has been made a Companion of the Order of the Star of India (C.S.I.), for his services as Chairman of the Board of Trustees for the improvement of Calcutta.

Mr. W. T. S. Stallybrass (Head of Grant's, 1900-01) has been made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (O.B.E.) for his services as a Section Director of the Ministry of Munitions.

Mr. H. B. Figgis (1880-1881) has been made a Member (M.B.E.) of the same Order for his services as a Member of the City of London Advisory Committee.

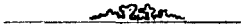
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
