THE CRICKET SEASON OF 1915.

MATCHES PLAYED 10.
WON 5: LOST 5: DRAWN 0.

THIS has been an exceptional season. Of last year's Pinks the larger number are serving with the colours and one is reported missing at the Dardanelles. We had expected Thacker to be our captain and Thompson our chief bowler, but both are now on our war list. The year's record does credit to those who remained. Illness at Charterhouse deprived us of our chief match, but we had two games with Radley and one with Tonbridge. We beat Radley on their ground and they us on ours. Against Ton-

bridge we made a good score, but their two fine batsmen were too strong for our youthful bowlers. Our best victory was over Radley, when the game was forced against time, while our worst defeat was at the hands of M.C.C.

Oliver, the only remaining Pink, of course became captain. Last year his batting was perhaps better than his bowling, but this year he proved our mainstay with the ball, although at times he seemed somewhat inclined to keep himself on too long. Experience will doubtless give him a better eye for the game. His bowling seems to have been bad for his batting, but we may well hope that he will recover his nerve at the wicket. Gardiner has the making of a fine bat, and we regret that the call of war prevents

him from helping us next year. The discovery of the season was the batting of Andrews. He got no colours last year because, although he had many pretty strokes, there was no power behind them. This year, although he is still young, he found the power, and so used it that we have strong hope of his future performance. Greig, who showed much promise as a small boy and then fell off, did much to restore what seemed a lost hope. He made a most effective bowler and displayed considerable vigour with the bat. Gee has a persevering temper, and both with bat and with ball did better than some of his critics expected; but Robinson, though at times he shows skill, barely came up to expectation. He also is gone before his time, a loss to us and a gain to the army. Pakenham-Walsh has great steadiness for so young a player, and his strokes have no lack of vigour. Julian was energetic but did not maintain the standard of his fine innings against the H.A.C. Stones, another of our younger players, took a fair number of wickets at no great cost, while May made a capable wicket-keeper. Of the other players Radermacher and Salwey are young enough to encourage our hopes, and Rudge's bowling shows great promise.

The fielding of the eleven under Hobbs' coaching showed remarkable improvement, and the whole team proved itself willing to learn, a good omen for the next season.

Obitnary.

PRO PATRIA.

CAPTAIN SIR HERBERT ARCHER CROFT, Bart., The Herefordshire Regiment; 2nd Lieutenant Alfred Crosfield Vernon Miles, The Welsh Regiment; Lieutenant Charles Nigel Gordon Walker, The South Staffordshire Regiment.

Of Sir Archer Croft, who was at the School from April 1882 to Christmas 1884, we append a notice from *The Times*:—

'Captain Sir H. Archer Croft, Bart., 1st Herefordshire Regiment, reported missing on August 10 in Gallipoli, and now believed to have died of his wounds, was born on September 5, 1868. The eldest son of the late Sir Herbert Croft, 9th Bart., of Lugwardine Court, Hereford, and Georgiana Lady Croft, he was educated at Westminster, and joined the 4th King's Shropshire Light Infantry with a view to entering the Grenadier Guards, but he went out to Australia instead to manage some family property there. Within three days of the declaration of war he enlisted as a private in the 1st Herefordshire Regiment (T.), offering to raise a company of 150 men, which he did within a week. He was gazetted second lieutenant two weeks later, and Captain in November, 1914. Sir Archer was a D.L. and J.P. for Herefordshire, High Sheriff in 1911, and a member of Herefordshire County Council. He gave a great deal of his time to public work in his county, especially in connection with the Herefordshire General Hospital.

'The tenth baronet (creation 1671) of Croft Castle, Hereford, Sir Archer was the head of one of the few families in England who can trace a direct male descent from a time before the Conquest, being descended from Bernard de Croft, who lived in the time of Edward the Confessor. In Domesday Book this same Bernard is mentioned as holding the lands of Croft, which his descendants inherited until the close of the eighteenth cen-

tury, when the property was sold. Since the days of the Crusades, when Sir Jasper Croft was created a Knight of the Holy Sepulchre by Godfrey of Boulogne at the taking of Jerusalem, A.D. 1100, the Crofts have continuously served their king and country as soldiers. Members of the family have fought in most of the English wars, notably, at the Battle of Agincourt, in the Wars of the Roses, in which the Crofts were prominent Yorkists, in the Civil Wars, in which they were staunch Royalists, in the various campaigns in Scotland, France, and Flanders, and more recently at Quatre Bras, where the seventh baronet was wounded and mentioned in dispatches when serving as a Lieutenant in the Grenadier Guards. Two brothers of Sir Archer Croft are serving in the present war, Major W. D. Croft, of the Cameronians, who has been mentioned in dispatches while serving in France; and Captain Owen Croft, of 1/1st Shropshire Yeomanry.'

Mr. MILES, who was at the School from September, 1908, to Election 1913, was the second son of Mr. E. V. Miles, of Hampstead. His elder brother is an officer in the South Wales Borderers.

Mr. Walker, who was at the School from September, 1905, to Easter, 1908, was a son of Mr. F. A. Walker, of Gravesend.

Of Mr. J. W. Ferguson, R.N.R., a fellow officer writes as follows:—'He was in a quiet way always very fond of Westminster and would, I am sure, like it to be known to O.WW. that he died a very fine death, after a long period of very hard service, in a great charge in which nearly all his brother officers perished also. This I learn from officers in his Division. They tell me he was thought very highly of by all both as a soldier and as a man, and I can well believe it.'

We have lost two men of note in the records of Water. We take the notice of the former from *The Times*:—

'The death took place at Henley on September 9 of Mr. Herbert Thomas Steward, aged 76, one of the greatest authorities on rowing and the history of the sport and author of "Records of Henley Regatta."

'For over thirty years Mr. Steward had been on the list of Stewards of Henley Royal Regatta, and had served as Chairman of the Committee of Management since the abolition of the old Committee in 1885. He devoted an immense amount of time to the Regatta Course, now one of the best in the world. He

had been President of the Leander Club since the death of Sir Patrick Colquhoun, and Chairman of the Committee of the Amateur Rowing Association since 1881. He served as Chairman of the Olympic Regatta Committee in 1912. In 1906 he was presented by the amateur oarsmen of the country with a gold replica of the Henley Grand Challenge Cup.

'Educated at Westminster at a period when "water" still flourished at the School, Mr. Steward played Association football as a young man and was one of the founders of the Football Association. He was senior partner in the firm of Hunt and Steward, Surveyors, Parliament Street, S.W.'

THOMAS KYNASTON GASKELL, who died on September 13, was at the School from 1852 to 1858, when he was elected Head to Trinity. He coxed the Cambridge boat in 1861. He took Orders and was many years Rector of Folksworth, in Huntingdonshire.

To move from the river to the sea we must record the death of a yachtsman, George Francis Werry, who was at the School from 1866 to 1869. He lived at Cowes and died there on August 20.

A contemporary of our own, who was at the School until last Christmas, Arthur Guy Worthington, was drowned in Harnullah Lake on July 22. Last February he passed into the Staff College at Quetta, and joined in May. He was a son of Mr. Arthur Worthington, of Singleton, Sussex.

Too late for further notice at present we learn of the loss in the great battle of Lt.-Col. Logan, D.S.O., Capt. Bonser, Mr. C. Hurst Brown and Mr. P. M. Marks, and of the death of Sir Thomas Bucknill.

It is a great pity, as they are excellent photographs and have the additional merit of being remarkably cheap.

Not only are views of school life interesting to send to one's friends, but they make a splendid memento of Westminster days when one becomes an O.W.

May I venture to ask you to publish this letter in order to give the postcards the publicity they richly deserve?

P. E. Lloyd-Williams, writing from Dera Ismail Khan, N.W.F. Province, after mentioning some O.WW.

out there, continues :-

'Personally I was in charge of the police at Gaya, when after petitioning Government since the beginning of the War, I joined the I.A.R. and was posted to the regiment at Dera Ismail Khan. I was shortly sent to this place, where we are supposed to be under war conditions. The movable column consists of detachments of this regiment, the 45th Sikhs, 87th Punjabis, 121st Pioneers, 97th Deccan Infantry, and 32nd Mountain Battery. Its raison d'être is that the Mahsuds have been giving some trouble lately by raiding villages this side of the border. They are very elusive warriors, and as the villagers help them, one seldom collars any of them. Their modus operandi is generally to come down in bodies of from 10 to 100 or so, lie up in a dry nullah in the daytime, raid a village at night and get back to the hills before the troops can get out. I had one weary week in charge of a party at Yarik soon after I arrived in D.I.K., and I was constantly called out on false alarms by the villagers. Another little game of the Mahsuds is, if they've been out on a raid and are being caught up by troops, to hide their rifles and pretend to be ordinary agricultural labourers. There was a rumour that they were going to attack this place in about ten days, but I am afraid there is nothing in it. I hope to get out to the war between now and October, but Cavalry are not much wanted in France and the Civil authorities are not keen on Policemen leaving the country in case of trouble. There are three of us here, the subaltern in command, another who combines the duties of quartermaster and looking after two squadrons, and myself who look after the other squadrons and do mess president and general bottle-washer. We are living in mudhuts and the furniture of one's room consists of a camptable, chair, and a camp-bed. We get polo three days a week and occasional games of football and hockey, rather strenuous games for a temperature of over 100 in the shade. I am hoping to get ten days' leave soon, but they do not seem keen on giving I.A.R. men leave.
